WAR BULLETINS.
London News Agency dispatch says Dismude was recaptured and the Germans driven out at the point of the bayonet Friday afternoon by a brigade of French marines.

Berlin war office admits that the Austrians are retiring before the Russians, but in good order.

Britain on Friday advanced fourteen million dollars to Belgium and four million dollars to Serbia to carry on war.

German General Von Der Goltz, of Brussels, warned the civil guards that they will be shot if they do not serve the German government.

There was a thrilling battle in midair on Friday between four German and four allied aeroplanes in which the Germans were all destroyed and eight aviators killed.

Russians have occupied several more Galician towns and continue to advance.

Berlin newspapers contain large casualty lists of Prussian guards, and intimate that they were surprised by the British on the Yser.

CANADIAN OFFICERS
TWO HUNDRED TOO MANY WENT WITH FIRST CONTINGENT.
Corps Reorganized—Proposal for Those Idle to Join Kitchener's New Army Now Being Formed.
Salisbury, Eng., Nov. 13.—There are more than 200 Canadian officers out of work. They are looking for employment. Since the reorganization of the companies into platoons according to the British system, they have been rendered jobless—nothing to do but report at headquarters every morning at 10 o'clock. Fifty of them are growing monotonous. These officers include a great many several captains and a great many lieutenants. The most qualified leaders of course, remain with the Canadian force, but those who do not come up to the standard were dropped.
And the question now is, "What is to be done with these officers?" Many views are put forward, but the one which the most emphasis is laid is that they will be taken into Kitchener's army of 100,000 men. Officers are needed, and there is a possibility that the Canadians will be given a chance to show what they can do.
There is also some talk of establishing a training school for the Canadians at Alickano. Major-General Sam Hughes was approached with regard to this, and it is understood that he quite favorably disposed. Most of the officers who have been left out in the cold would like nothing better than a training course so that they may properly equip themselves.
