ALDERMEN TO COLLECT FUNDS FOR THE NEEDY IN THE CITY.

Civic Finance Committee Approved of Plan and Matter Will be Arranged at Special Meeting of City Council Monday Night.

The plan to have the aldermen make a collection of the city for funds to help the needy in the city was approved of at a special meeting of the Civic Finance committee on Friday night, and Mayor Shaw has called a special meeting of the City Council for Monday evening to make arrangements for the canvass and to deal with any other business which may be brought up.

The plan is to have the aldermen canvass their respective wards, and they will be assisted in their work by members of the different charitable organizations.

It will be remembered that the Civic Aid committee, at a meeting held on Tuesday evening last, approved of a plan set forth by Mayor Shaw, asking that the aldermen make the collection for funds, and a resolution was passed calling upon the Civic Finance committee to take the matter up.

It is desired to have the special meeting of council as soon as possible, as it will be necessary to go ahead with the canvass at once.

GERMAN DEFEAT SURE.

For Has Not Kaiser Cut Off Feroocious Moustache Ends.

Copenhagen, Nov. 14.—The Kaiser has clipped off the upstanding ends of his moustache. This startling change in the emperor's appearance was observed the last day or two when the emperor was passing through central Germany on his way to inspect a large number of recruits completing their military training.

The loss of the aggressively erect moustache extremities robs Wilhelm II. very much of his ferocious martial appearance, and some persons seem to think that stamps upon his face the outlines of a dejected depression. When it was observed some time after the beginning of the war that the Kaiser's hair had turned white, no one paid much attention to the change, but the removal of the moustache ends has struck the public imagination and, strange as it may seem, has done more, perhaps, than anything else to convince the population of Berlin that the war outlook is becoming bad for Germany.

The absolutely chastened appearance of the Kaiser due to the absence of his moustache ends, is attributed to his sadness about the German reverses. In these circumstances his advisors may urge him to allow his moustache to attain its former conspicuous dimensions.

VETERANS GET PERMISSION TO HOLD TARGET PRACTICE IN THE ARMORIES.

Arrangements have been made through Col. T. D. R. Hemming, Lieut.-Col. Hughes, 21st Battalion and Major H. J. Dawson, allowing the Kingston Veterans Association the use of the armories for target practice next Thursday evening at eight o'clock. The Jackson record target will be used by the veterans. There are some good shots among the ex-service men and their work will be watched with some interest.

RECEIVED SUDDEN SUMMONS.

Joseph Brough, Deseronto, Dropped Dead After Shovelling Snow.

Joseph Brough, aged twenty-seven years, youngest son of Michael Brough, of Deseronto, dropped dead of heart failure on Friday, after he had finished shovelling snow around his home. He had been in good health. His sister noticed him fall and rushed to his assistance, but he was then passed human aid. Deceased was a Roman Catholic. The funeral will take place on Sunday afternoon, at St. Vincent de Paul church, after which the remains will be interred in Deseronto cemetery. The young man's mother died a month ago.

The annual intercollegiate harrier meet was contested by Queen's, Royal Military College, Varsity and McGill on Saturday morning. At eleven o'clock the four participating teams lined up at Queen's gymnasium and covered a distance of six miles. Half of the distance was covered along the roadway and the other three miles across the country wastes, ploughed fields, etc.

McGill appeared to be the strongest of the teams in that it had two of last year's members upon it while the other teams were comprised chiefly of raw material. Manager H. S. Hayes of the Varsity harrier squad, appeared to be quite confident of victory and had little doubt but that his contingent would prove its mastery.
