### THE HALLS OF QUEEN'S

SERMON BY ARCHDEACON PAT-ERSON SMYTH, MONTREAL.

In Convocation Hall on Sunday Morning—Meeting of the Alma Mater Society.

Archdeacon Paterson-Smyth, rector of St. George's church, Montreal, and one of the foremost preachers of the Anglican church in Canada, conducted the service at convocation hall on Sunday morning. He took his text from Romans ix, 20, 21: "Nay but, O man, who art thou that repliest against God? shall the thing formed say to him that formed it, Why hast thou made me thus? Hath not the potter power over the clay, of the same lump to make one vessel unto honor, and another unto dishonor?"

In opening his sermon the preacher said that these verses were more perplexed to inquiring minds than any others in the Bible. This is clearly a parable of nations, said St. Paul when speaking about the nation Israel, as the clay is in the hands of the potter, so are we in the hands of God. The duty and purpose of our church and nation at this terrible time especially is to make the people turn to God as their leader and helper. When the very patient potter made a failure of the first vessel he threw it away, but tried again and again, and at last was successful in making it into a vessel for washing the king's feet. This illustrates the potter's never-failing faith in God, and God's irresistible power over the clay.

Never has there been so much interest taken in the nation's affairs as at the present time. We do not get the under news of the terrible conflict, but only the news at the surface. God's inspired words through the Bible sink in far deeper than the surface. As Paul and Jeremiah learned that a lump of clay cannot decide its own destiny, neither can a nation decide her destiny by any brute force, but that their fate is in the hands of God. We find throughout the Bible that no righteous nation has ever been destroyed and that no evil nation has ever emerged victorious in any way.

We see the people crowding into the churches to-day, a thing we never saw before. The reason is this, because the people are beginning to realize that God is their leader and that their destiny is in His hands. At the time of the French revolution the people thought that France was down and out, but she is gradually being turned into a new nation just like the potter's vessel. No nation will be the same after this terrible war is over. Germany has become the very curse of every nation because of her adversity. She is losing faith in God. The question is "Will God break her into atoms?" Her issue is in God's hands.

We do not know why Britain should be the foremost nation of the world. During the last fifteen centuries of Christianity there has grown into our nation a heart a sense of Christianity. Does not this parable of the nations appeal to the people also? Their character is moulded by the keen edge of circumstances. In conclusion, the preacher said, be hopeful, be grateful, as ye think of the loving justice of God. If through your fault your vessel has been marred by some sin, God will not give you up but He has plenty of patience and will give you a chance to redeem yourself.

The Alma Mater society met in Convocation hall on Saturday evening. J. D. McCrae tendered his resignation as general convener of the Convocation committee on the grounds that as he was not in favor of social functions being held at the university this year he could not meet with them this week. His resignation was accepted and Fred S. Milliken was appointed to fill the vacancy. The final year asked for the use of Grant hall for their annual dance on Dec. 4th. This was granted.

The music and drama committee asked for the use of Grant hall for their patriotic concert to be held on Wednesday night. This was also granted. The Alma Mater executive advised that a Belgium relief fund committee composed of E. R. Robb, J. W. North, Mr. Stackhouse, R. P. Patterson, J. McVab, C. H. Pitkin, B. W. Pitkin and J. D. McCrae, with Mr. Chambers as convener, be appointed to canvass the students for subscriptions to help the suffering Belgians. A debate was held between arts '15 and '16. Messrs. Graham and Erb, arts '15, were on the affirmative, and Messrs. Beechey and Singleton were on the negative. The subject was: "Resolved, that capital punishment should be abolished." Arts '15 emerged victorious.

**Killed Bear Near Lavant.** The Westport Hunt club, which rose annually into camp at Robinson Lake near Lavant, was successful this year. S. Sully found a bear, coming down a hill towards him when he only had a .2 rifle with him. A bear hunt then took place and it was followed for more than two miles. It offered fight again but C. J. Speagie quickly disposed of it with a shot from a .251 rifle right through the head. Carrying a 250 pound bear two miles through the brush is no picnic. They made a sling and four men brought it out, and it was transferred to the stage at Godfrey.

**Met Death At Iroquois.** Charles Redmond, of Iroquois, met death near G. T. R. station at that town on Sunday morning. The early morning express from Toronto had slowed down to let him off after five o'clock. Several hours later his body was picked up by a freight train. He had evidently fallen on his head, and met instant death. The deceased was a brother of Russell Redmond, lately a clerk in the Montreal bank, of Kingston. He was on his way home from Brighton.

### WORST GALE OF YEAR Has Been Raging On Lake Ontario Past Few Days.

The worst gale of the year has been raging on Lake Ontario the past few days. Marine men say that the wind at times reached a velocity of forty-five miles an hour. A dispatch from Oswego states that the steamship A. D. Davidson, well known at Kingston, left there at noon Sunday and after fighting her way up the lake forty miles was compelled to return to port. The sea washed over the pilot house. The Stevenson and Carney, a tow barge of the Oranburg Coal and Transportation company, are sunk in about sixteen feet of water at the Lackawanna trestle. The Witbeck, another tow barge, owned by the same company, is in the harbor disabled with a hole in her side.
