ROUTE MARCHES LIKED THE CHURCH PULPITS

BY THE MEN OF THE 21ST OVERSEAS BATTALION. THE MINISTERS WHO WILL PREACH ON SUNDAY.

Announcements Made by the Various Denominations As to Their Services—Sermon Topics and Musical Selections.

No date has yet been set for the long route march of the 21st overseas battalion mentioned in yesterday's Whig. A few days ago the first half battalion took a seven mile hike through the country.

After a week's fine practising the battalion has improved wonderfully. The men were first put to shooting with miniature (.22 cal.) Ross rifles at targets, three inches in diameter twenty yards distant.

Pte. J. Cope, "A" company, was the best shot in the shooting on Thursday. The best company shots were: "B" company, Serg. T. Gordon; "C" company, Pte. E. C. Webster; "D" company, Pte. J. Sullivan; "E" company, Corp. J. Donald; "F" company, Serg. E. Perry; "G" company, Serg. Verdon; "H" company, Serg. E. Laplante; machine gun section, Pte. J. Flanagan.

The 21st battalion paraded to the cricket field on Saturday afternoon and had a picnic. The men were led by W. S. Hughes who is in command. The thousand men looked splendid as they faced the lens; every man at attention. The officers formed the front line, and the men were ranged in companies behind.

Two officers of "A" company are on the sick list. Capt. Jones is confined to the military hospital with a severe cold. Lieut. W. Maenece is confined as a result of an explosion of the accretion lamp on his automobile on Thursday night.

The N.C.O.'s of the battalion are gradually being appointed, as the best men are used. There have been no partiality shown and every man has an equal chance. In the orders of Friday a long list of transfers was published. The military police have been chosen and also the batmen and grooms to the headquarters staff. The transport section is being filled.
