FINANCIAL MATTERS.

Toronto, Nov. 20-"The output in gold from Porcupine for 1914 will total approximately \$6,000,000, of which amount, within that period, \$1,320,000 in dividends will be distributed amongst the shareholders in two campanies alone, says Hamilton B. Wills of the Standard Stock Exchange in his weekly mining despatch. This bullion production is wonderful from a camp which was unknown five years ago, as well as coming from only nine mines—Hollinger, Acme, Dome Mines, Porcu-pine Crown, McIntrye, Dome Lake, Porcupine Vipond, Rea, and Porcu-pine Pet. During 1915 the bullion to be shipped to the marts of the world from Porcupine will total \$10,000,-000. During this period the number of dividend-paying companies of Por-cupine will likely be four times what they now are.

Ford Assets Grow.

Detroit, Nov. 20-Total assets of \$61,632,257,16 and a surplus of \$48,-827,032:07 are shown in the balance sheet of the Ford Motor company for the year ended Sept. 30. 1914. Despite complaints of general business depression, these figures are practically double the corresponding figures of last year, when assets amounted to \$35,033,919.86 and the surplus was \$28,124,173.68.

Cash on hand and in the banks on Sept. 30, 1914 amounted to \$27,441, 468.79 against \$13,225,710.82 at the same time last year. Buildings and building fixtures now reach the total of \$10,714,982.45, compared with \$4,615,156.82 last year.

Electric Railway Earnings. New York, Nov. 20-With few exceptions, electric railway lines of the country are now reporting decreases in earnings as compared with corresponding months of 1913. In some cases, where exceptional factors operate, gains are being shown, but in all cases the rate of gain has been largely reduced. City lines appear to be feeling the decrease in traffic more than the interurban lines. doubtless due to reduction operation of industrial plants.

To Increase Capital.

Toronto, Nov. 20-Shareholders of the Cochrane Cobalt will meet Monday to authorize an increase in the capitalization from \$500,000 to \$1,-000,000. The scheme is to issue the new stock at 10 cents a share. This would provide \$50,000 for development. The mine has been idle for many months.
