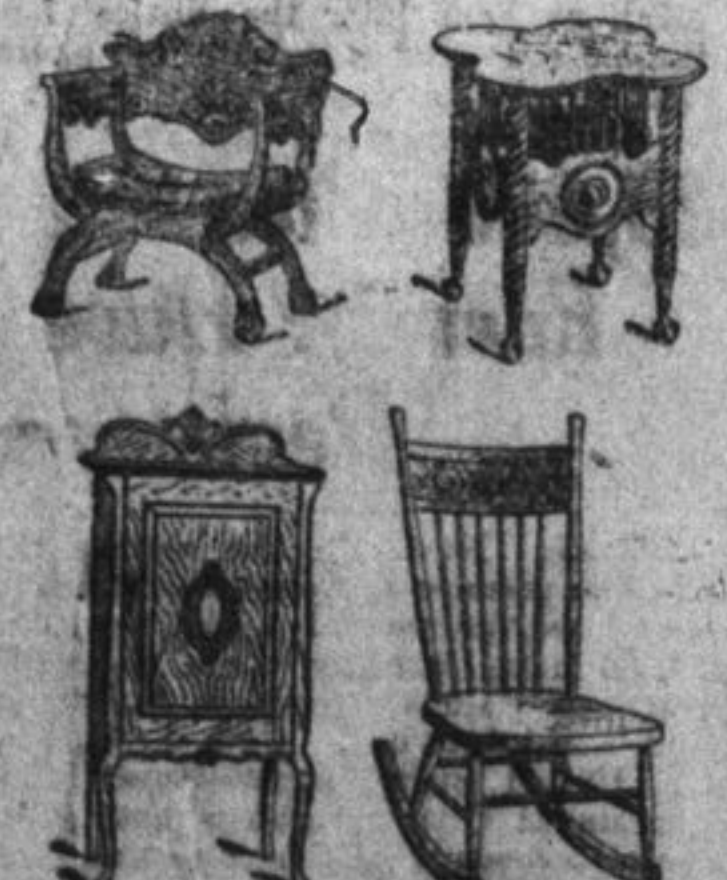

THE FRONT TOWNSHIPS

AND GOODROADS OVERDRAFTS UNDER DISCUSSION

By the County Council—The Children's Aid Society Asks For An Increased County Grant.

The Frontenac County Council devoted some time on Wednesday afternoon discussing a motion made by Councillors Freeman and Hawkey that a resolution be passed at the June session, providing for the charging of six per cent. on good roads overdrafts be rescinded, as the result of it would be the charging of interest twice over on the five front townships, which alone were interested in the good road system. Discussion reverted back to the old toll roads, the Reeves of the five townships pointing out that their municipalities had paid for these roads, and enlightening the back township representatives on this point.

Councillor McVeigh brought the discussion to a high level when he remarked that the council seemed to be divided into two camps—back and front. He did not consider this right. When he came to the County Council he understood that he was representing the whole county and not just one particular part.

The point was emphasized by Councillor Foley that when the good roads system was adopted, it was clearly understood that the thirteen townships not directly interested would not have to pay one cent. This plan had been followed in 1911.

In order that the five front townships will not be charged double interest, an adjustment will be made. A delegation from the Kingston branch of the Children's Aid Society, consisting of Prof. Alexander Laird, G. M. Macdonnell, K.C., Rev. T. W. G. M. Mason, Rev. J. A. Macpherson, Savary, Rev. J. Laing and Inspector Wylie, waited upon the council and asked for an increased grant. The objects of the society, its needs and the good work it is doing in Frontenac were placed before the council. At present the grant is \$175. Consideration of the request was postponed.

It was late on Thursday morning, when the councillors went into session, as two committees had been meeting. The Property committee was waiting upon by various insurance men, who sought a share of the additional \$25,000 insurance to be placed on the court house.

By-laws were passed confirming by-laws passed by Ugo and Bedford township council for the closing of the roads running through those townships in the interests of the C.P.R. A by-law was passed providing for a monthly audit of the treasurer's books and for the countersigning of all cheques by the county clerk.

The council confirmed the by-law to grant \$2,000 to the Canadian patriotic fund, made at a special meeting held in September.

Councillor Calvin reported that the special committee appointed by the council to act as a patriotic fund relief committee, had attended to three cases, which were all that were reported to be in need in Frontenac.

Councillor Freeman told of another case that should be looked into, as he was told that some dependants of a certain Frontenac overseas volunteer were in need.

The council adjourned until 10 a.m. Friday for the benefit of committees.
