## THE POTATO CONTEST WILL GO TO THE FRONT

### IN FRONTENAC COUNTY — THE PRIZES AWARDED.

The Contest Was Possible Through Kindness of Kingston Board of Trade and Several Prominent Citizens.

Through the kindness of the Kingston Board of Trade and several prominent citizens, C. Main, district agricultural representative, was able to inaugurate a Potato Growing contest in Frontenac county this year. Prizes were awarded on the following basis:

Report of inspector on thoroughness of field culture, 100 points. Certified report of yield as submitted by competitor, 100 points. Award of judge on one bushel exhibits sent to Kingston fair, 100 points.

A written report of competitors showing the expense and profits of the enterprise and other particulars, such as date of planting, variety planted, etc., 100 points.

Where these records were supplemented by a short history or story of the work, due credit was allowed in making the awards. To the contestant who won the highest number of points out of the possible 400, the first prize was awarded, and the rest on the same basis.

The cash prizes donated by the Kingston Board of Trade and other prominent citizens were:

1st, \$15; 2nd, \$12; 3rd, \$10; 4th, \$8; 5th, \$6; 6th, \$4.

The first prize was awarded to Archie B. O'Connor, R.R. No. 3, Hartwood; 2nd, Dwight J. Walker, Hartwood; 3rd, Carmon J. Lloyd, Drew's Mill; 4th, Edwin Coulter, R.R. No. 2, Kingston; 5th, Arthur Botting, narrowmouth; 6th, James R. Henderson, R.R. No. 1, Kingston.

The actual yield of the one-tenth acre plot in the competition and also the figured yield per acre. The highest total yield per acre was only 839 1/3 bushels. While this is possibly above the average yield of potatoes in the county, still it could not be considered to be a large yield in a competition of this nature. It might be of interest to know that the highest yield of the competitor who won first prize in Russell county potato growing contest this year had a total yield of 652 bushels per acre at a net profit of \$302.50 per acre; so that there is room for improvement in this work. While the entries were not as large as anticipated, nor was there the interest and enthusiasm displayed by the competitors that one would wish to see in a competition of this nature, still after all when it is considered that this was the first competition of its kind held in Frontenac county, the results were very encouraging and there was no doubt but what the competition had stimulated an interest not only in potato growing but in the other farm crops as well among the young men who took part in the competition.

Should the potato growing contest be continued next year it is hoped to receive thirty or forty applications for entering the competition.

### LIEUT.-COL. A. B. CUNNINGHAM

Asked to Command Army Officers' Training Corps at Queen's.

Lieut.-Col. A. B. Cunningham has been asked to command an army officers' training corps, to be formed at Queen's University, and Capt. P. G. C. Campbell has been asked to take over the duties of adjutant.

The training corps for officers is just a new proposition put on foot the past few days. A mass meeting of the students was called on Friday afternoon at five o'clock, in Grant hall, for organization.

### Kingston Poultry Association

The Kingston Poultry association held a general business meeting on Thursday night to discuss the arrangements for their annual show to be held on January 5th, 6th and 7th. It was at first thought that Ontario hall could be used, but this place, the show will have to be held somewhere else. There are several suitable locations being out in the near future and the final arrangements made.

The association had offered to donate the proceeds of the show to the Red Cross society if they could use Ontario hall.

### Ill In Toronto.

G. W. Gaden, Toronto, a former well-known Kingstonian and also a former president of the Kingston Old Boys' association in Toronto is quite ill in the latter city, suffering from paralysis following the bursting of a blood vessel in his brain. He received word of his illness on Friday morning. For many years Mr. Gaden was employed at the wholesale house of Macnee & Minnes as bookkeeper.

### PROF. J. L. MORISON WILL JOIN CANADIANS AT FIRST OF YEAR

Addressed Volunteers for Overseas Service at Y. M. C. A. Headquarters in Ontario Hall on Thursday Evening—The Men Are Being Provided With Fine Entertainment.

Addressing a meeting in Ontario hall, on Thursday night, at the Y.M.C.A. headquarters for overseas volunteers, Prof. J. L. Morison, of Queen's University, stated that after the new year he would join the Canadian soldiers at the front. He is at the present time taking military drill so as to fit himself for service at the front.

Prof. Morison declared that England was standing up for a weaker country, and added: "I have more respect for the man who is going to the front to-day than any other man I know of. Speaking about Italy he said that she would not take arms against England, as England had in years passed helped her in times of extinction."

"In the face of this German butchery, are we to stay at home and see it go on?" asked the speaker.

F. J. Wilson, secretary of the Kingston Y.M.C.A., is in charge of the work at Ontario hall for a few days, until a new official arrives from Toronto.
