THE HISTORY AND OBJECTS OF THE ORDER.

In the early part of the tenth century, on account of the number of European christians who went on a pilgrimage to Jerusalem, attempts were made to afford these pilgrims shelter and hospitality, to protect them against some of the perils of the Journey. An organization was then established for these purposes by a body of merchants from Amalfi, Italy. By the middle of the twelfth century the order had built a hospice and two christian churches in Jerusalem, and the character of a military knighthood had been conferred upon it by Baldwin II., thethen Latin


