WAR BULLETINS.

Two British merchant steamers were sunk in the English Channel by German submarines operating from Zeebrugge or Ostend. The crews were rescued.

Winston Churchill, speaking in the British House of Commons on Friday, said Britain could afford to lose one super-dreadnought every month for a year and still win out against Germany.

Lord Charles Bessford, following Churchill, said the German fleet would emerge some day, and luck or no luck, Britain would win.

A German colonel, who is a prisoner in Paris says that if the Germans do not pierce the allied lines by November 28th, a general retreat will be ordered.

The Paris bourse will open on December 7th for cash trading.

The British collier Kharatoum was blown up at the mouth of the Humber river on Friday by a mine. The crew was saved.

The Germans have returned strongly to the attack of the Russians in Poland. Fighting is fierce, and several divisions have been annihilated. Many high German officers have been killed.

One hundred Canadian doctors are now at Havre, France, to establish a hospital.

Russians have gained another great victory near Cracow.

GERMAN WARSHIP SUNK.

Paris, Nov. 28.—A Petrograd dispatch to the Matin to-day declares that a German warship, believed to be the Hertha, has been sunk near Libau. The dispatch also carries an unconfirmed report that the battleship Kaiser Wilhelm der Grosse has been torpedoed and sunk in the Baltic.

The battleship Kaiser Wilhelm der Grosse, evidently referred to in the Matin dispatch, is one of Germany's pre-dreadnoughts, having been built in 1901. The warship is on 10,000 tons displacement and carries a crew of 658 men. Her main battery is composed of four 9.4 inch and fourteen 5.9 inch guns.

The Kaiser Wilhelm, now mentioned, should not be confused with the auxiliary cruiser of that name which was sunk off Africa.

THE FUTURE OF BELGIUM.

German Roman Catholic Leader
Airs His Views.

Amsterdam, Nov. 28.—The prominent German Roman Catholic leader, Herr Erzberger, has published in the Anzeiger-Rundschau an article on the future of Belgium. Germany, he points out, cannot tolerate as its western frontier a state appearing to be neutral. The Germans, he says, have assured themselves of a free passage through to the channel against England, and their army did not make so many sacrifices in Belgium for nothing.

Herr Erzberger would not be content with a semi-independent Belgium under German occupation.

"The fate of Belgium," he says, "has to be so arranged that England can no longer use it as an instrument on the continent. Belgium must be made a defensive and offensive arm against England."

FLEEING FROM BRESLAU.

Approach Of Germans Causes Great Consternation.

Geneva, Switzerland, via Paris, Nov. 28.—Seven thousand refugees, mostly members of wealthy German families in Breslau, have arrived in Lunich during the last forty-eight hours. They declare that the city is in a state of consternation owing to the reported approach of the Russians, and that business is at a standstill.

In the duchy of Baden, the reservists of the years 1891-1894, now mostly men of forty to forty-five years of age, have been called out. These reservists, who are stated to number about 350,000 men, are being distributed in the forts along the Rhine so as to liberate the younger men there for active service.
