Valuations Were Too Low. Toronto, Nov. 28.—Under the authority of an amendment to the succession duty act, made in the last session of the legislature, it is understood that the succession duties branch of the provincial treasury will appoint a commissioner to conduct an inquiry into the estates of the late Hon. George A. Cox and E. W. Cox. According to the inventory filed in the estate of the late Senator Cox, the total valuation was about \$900,000, while that of his son was placed at \$499,000. The provincial treasurer apparently is not satisfied with either of these valuations, and both estates running into large figures, he is taking the method of naming a commissioner rather than have a reappraisal made of the various items in the schedules of the inventories. This is the first time that the new provision in the law has been invoked, and while no official announcement has been made, it is suggested that Judge Middleton will be the commissioner, and will proceed forthwith.

MAY GO AT NEW YEAR'S.

The Second Contingent May Cross To England. Ottawa, Nov. 27.—It is expected that the second contingent will be ready to leave for England January 1st, fully equipped including the latest artillery, weapons which are to reason if you can, for rest assured a terrible account shall be mandated of this unparalleled outrage on humanity. When the next contingent leaves for the Canadian front, the Canada staff at once be re-equipped with 100,000 men—scale arms in the dominion. Rumor has it that Major General Sam Hughes will command the second Canadian army division when it leaves for the front which will not likely be until spring. While the next contingent will probably leave for England early in the new year, it will likely be kept at Salisbury Plain training until spring, judging by the experience of the first division. Lord Kitchener evidently insists on a thoroughly trained and seasoned troops.

Major General Hughes speaking at London intimated that if the war is not over by spring he will get in to the fight. This is taken by many to mean that he will himself take command of the next division, however, it is only rumor and there is no surmising what General Hughes may do or decide between now and next spring.

MILES OF TRANSPORTS TAKEN

Well Provided With Hospital Supplies at Austria's Expense. London, Nov. 27.—The Morning Post correspondent at Petrograd telegraphs: "I hear that the field and hospital supplies of the Russians, about which there was some anxiety at the beginning of the war, owing to the sudden stoppage of exports, were never short, thanks to the capture of the entire stores accumulated by the Austrians for the Russian campaign. We heard at the time about this item of rich booty captured in Galicia, but private messages now explain the affair in more detail. "When the Austrians fled the Russians captured over twenty miles of transport carts almost entirely laden with hospital supplies. Many stood without their horses, which had been taken to assist in the fight and witnessed, powerless to move a step. The quantity of the supplies taken sufficed to furnish not merely the field hospitals at the front, but even to assist the base hospitals with certain materials which formerly had been imported and the want of which until Russian factories got going again, was at one period a matter of serious apprehension to the military authorities."

Canada Does Her Duty.

Canada Gazette. Every dollar of the cost of equipping and maintaining this for Canada, large force is being borne by the Canadian people, and, seeing the liberal scale of payment and allowances, the burden is a heavy one, however willingly borne. Even the Canadian private gets his 4s. 6d. per day—say, three times the amount earned by the English private soldier—and the Canadian scale of allowances for dependents is not less generous, while for the keep of the men on Salisbury Plain Canada pays the war office three shillings per man per day. In a word, Canada is doing her duty to herself and the empire whole-heartedly and with a wise generosity, reckoning not the cost seeing the great ends in view.

Many of them now employ high-salaried experts to advise and instruct in methods most efficient for enhancing or restoring beauty of face and figure. Shampoo and Hair Restorer. You complain of brittle, faded hair. You will find that keeping the scalp clean and healthy is the most effective way to restore the natural beauty and softness, but in selecting your shampoo avoid soaps or mixtures containing "free" alkali. By dissolving a teaspoonful of starch in a cup of hot water, you will have a mild, soothing, cleansing mixture that makes the head feel fine and removes all dust, dandruff and excess of oil, leaving the scalp clean and pliant, and assuring beautiful growth of long, lustrous, fluffy hair.

Don't Shave Or Superfluous Hair. Hair on face, neck or arms should never be shaved or clipped off, as that encourages its growth. The most effective method, which at the same time is perfectly harmless, is to mix a little powdered phenol in a paste with water and apply directly to the affected surface. When used in two or three minutes the hair will have vanished completely, leaving the skin quite smooth and clear. Since the virtues of powdered phenol as a hair remover have become generally known, most druggists now supply this in convenient one-ounce jars.
