MORE PRISONERS OF WAR
Were Brought To Fort Henry on Sunday.

A big round-up was made at Montreal and other adjacent points on Saturday, when more prisoners of war were taken into custody by the authorities and transferred to Kingston. Sixty-five were landed in the city of the C.T.R. train on Sunday afternoon, and taken to Fort Henry. On the way to Kingston one of the prisoners jumped the train near Brockville, but after a chase, was rounded up. The guards who brought the prisoners to the city left on the 1.40 C.T.R. train Monday morning, and will return again with about sixty more prisoners. When these arrive there will be over five hundred suspects imprisoned at Fort Henry.

Movements Of Vessels Reported Along The Harbor.

T. company will go into the dock for repairs. The steamers Keynor and Keyvieve are also waiting at the Kingston Shipbuilding wharf to enter the dock. They will both proceed to Brockville after repairs have been made, to lay up for the winter.

The government yachts, Premier and Speedy, called in port on Saturday afternoon, taking on pilot; and then cleared for Montreal.
