

### AMERICAN PRESS NOT TO BE BOUGHT OR BULLIED

The Bellman, of Minneapolis, a journal of high class, publishes a serof insolent notes which it has received from Julius Bacher, of Milwaukee, declaring that the Bellman's articles on the war "are written with ket to-day. spite and hatred of Germany." In the first of these letters, dated September 25th, Mr. Bacher speaks of having returned from Europe. With these abusive notes is printed a letter written by the editor of the Bellman to 1,350. Mr. Bacher, from which a couple of paragraphs may here be quoted : "We live in a free country, not Germany, where there is no such thing as a free press, and shall continue to express ourselves as we see it whether it suits the hyphenated American portion of our population or


