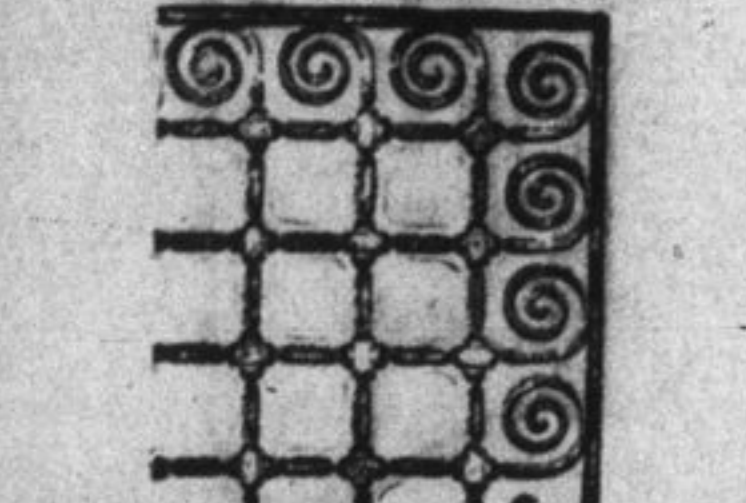

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Easy & Practical Home Dress Making Lessons

Prepared Especially For This Newspaper by Pictorial Review LACE AND VELVET.

One yard of velvet is sufficient for the skirt overbodice. The satin foundation is made by first turning a box-pleat in right front, turning under front edge at notches and taking up a tuck on slot perforations. Stitch pleat and turn under front edge of left front 1/2 inch and then turn under 1 inch for hem. Close under-arm seams as notched, close shoulder seams. Gather lower edge of front and back between double "T" perforations. Join front collar sections as notched, sew to neck edge as notched. Sleeve—Gather between double "T" perforations. Close seam as notched. Bring single "O" to small "O" perforation, fasten with hooks and eyes. Turn under lower edge of upper cuff section on slot perforations, lap of lower section to small "O" perforations, notches even and stitch. Turn lower part of lower cuff section back on double "O" perforations and tack. Sew cuffs to sleeve as notched. Adjust sleeve, stitching along line of small "O" perforations in underbody front and back, bringing single large "O" and double small "O" perforations together, easing in any fullness.



Now, taking up the velvet overbodice, first pleat lower edge and front of front section, placing "T" on corresponding small "O" perforations; bring double small "O" perforation at lower edge (forward of pleat), to double "O" perforation near under-shoulder edge and tack. Adjust a buckle over pleats in right front as illustrated. Center-front indicated by single small "O" perforations at upper and lower edges. Close under-body front and back between double "T" perforations. Arrange on underbody, under-arm seams even, bringing back edge of outer back to large "O" perforation in underbody front; stitch lower edges together. Bring large "O" perforation at shoulder to corresponding perforation in underbody front and back. Sew stay to lower edge of waist, center even (large "O" perforation indicates center-front). "Oh, the advantage of this velvet!" velvet is used for this design. The dress, however, is built on a satin foundation, 4 yards of 36-inch material being required for the purpose. Of lace, 10 yards, 19 inches wide, are needed. It is not necessary to line the velvet.

LIVE STOCK MARKETS

The Prices Paid At The Various Centres. Union Stock Yards, Toronto, Nov. 30.—Receipts were large; 200 cars, 4,142 cattle, 2,073 hogs, 2,203 sheep and lambs, 183 calves.

Cattle.—The quality of the fat cattle was better than for several markets, as high as \$8.50 being paid for a choice heifer and steer and \$8.00 for a straight load and price of heifers. Trade active and prices firm. Choice butcher's steers, \$7.50 to \$8.25 and two at \$8.50; good butcher's steers, \$7.00 to \$7.40; medium butcher's steers, \$6.60 to \$6.90; common butcher's steers, \$6.00 to \$6.40; choice butcher's heifers, \$7.75 to \$8.00; common butcher's heifers, \$7.00 to \$7.75; choice cows, \$6.50 to \$6.75 and two of prime quality at \$7.25; good cows, \$6.50 to \$6.75; canners, \$3.50 to \$4.75 trade brisk for canners and cutters.

Feeders and stockers.—Market was unchanged for stockers and feeders. Choice steers, \$6.25 to \$6.50; medium steers, \$5.75 to \$6.00; stockers, \$4.00 to \$5.50.

Milkers and Springers.—Market steady to strong at \$7.00 to \$105. each, bulk sold at \$75. to \$90. each.

Calves.—Receipts light and prices unchanged. Choice veals, \$10. to \$10.50.

Sheep and lambs.—Receipts liberal but prices firm for choice quality. Choice 80 to 90 lb. lambs sold at high figures; but coarse heavy lambs were easy at Thursday's price. Sheep, \$5.00 to \$5.75; culls and rams, \$2.50 to \$4.50; lambs, choice ewes and wethers, \$8.25 to \$8.70; heavy lambs, \$7.25 to \$7.50.

Hogs.—1,300 Winnipeg hogs were on sale, but prices remained firm. Selected, fed and watered, \$8.50 and \$7.15. F. O. B. cars and \$7.75 weighed off cars.

Montreal Castle. Montreal, Nov. 30.—Trade was fair without any material changes in prices with the exception of hogs, which were lower on West End market.

SIT IN RUINED HOMES

OLD MEN AND WOMEN UTTER SCARCELY A WORD. Over 600 Bodies Were Picked Up in One Street of Village of Normee in France.

Vitry-le-Francois, Dec. 2.—Black ruins which have just ceased smouldering, houses whose interiors have been demolished by bursting shells, leaving only the skeletons of their structures standing, still others where sides blown out, still others where only a chimney-stack remains erect, are common sights in this portion of the track of the armies fighting a short distance to the north.

Amid the desolation, in half-shattered shacks, sit women, children and old men, uttering scarcely a word, except about their husbands and fathers and sons away with the army, and from whom news is rare, if it comes at all. Lack of laborers makes it almost impossible for the villagers to start any repairs. Trade is at a standstill, and the common articles of domestic necessity are difficult to obtain, owing to the dislocation of transport.

Only a mile or two from Vitry the villages of Erignicourt and Courdemange have virtually disappeared, except for disorderly heaps of bricks, tiles and stones. The fields are dotted with deep holes caused by bursting German and French shells, while all about are small mounds, with small crosses formed of two broken branches of trees placed over them, without name or number to indicate the occupants.

Further away from Vitry is Normee, near Yers Champagne. Normee before the war possessed about 100 houses. Now there are but sixty, the rest having been blown to pieces or burned. The village passed from hand to hand several times during the German retreat to the Aisne.

It is placed in a capital position for defence from any side, and the opposing forces fought desperately for its possession. In its single street 510 German bodies were picked up on one day, as well as about 100 French dead. Everywhere there were furious combats, and graves strewn constructed and sheltered trenches on all the fields, while the excellently sided remain as they were during the battle, with pieces of exploded shells and accoutrements spread about.

It is even reported that some of the officers of the corps took the side of the men, saying that they were willing to fight at sea, but that it was not their matter to fight on land.

A number of them were sent to Ghent, but on arriving at the St. Pierre railway station in that town, fifty succeeded in escaping. Some of these, however, were rearrested at Ghent. Two hundred of the mutineers, including the officers and two subalterns, were shot.

I learn that the Germans have retired about ten miles on the Dixmude front.

TO BOMBARD PETROGRAD?

A Daring Plan Attributed to the German Fleet. Copenhagen, Dec. 2.—The German fleet is becoming more lively in the Baltic. Scandinavian and Russian despatches indicate preparations for striking a blow at Russian ports for ever entering the Gulf of Finland and possibly for the bombardment of Petrograd.

It is reported here from several sources that there is a great concentration of the fleet and German transport steamers along the Baltic coast, and a withdrawal of warships from Kiel to strengthen the Baltic squadron operating northwards in the Gulf of Bothnia.
