BULLET IN HIS FOOT

PERCY WRIGHT, OF KINGSTON, FIGHTING THE GERMANS.

Wound is Healing Nicely, and He Expects To Be Soon Back On the Firing Line Again.

G. W. Wright, 59 Charles street, stated, on Thursday morning, that he had heard from his son, Percy Wright, who has been fighting against the Germans. Mr. Wright's son, who came to Canada about two years ago, was a reservist of the 11th Hussars, and at the outbreak of the war was immediately recalled to England, leaving home on August 19th. When he reached the old country, his regiment had proceeded to the front, and he was transferred to the Royal Horse Guards, leaving England on October 5th for the battlefields. After continuous fighting, and some hair-breadth escapes, he was finally wounded (getting a bullet through the leg) some time in the early part of November, and is now at the military hospital at Edinburgh.

The last letter his father had from him stated that his wounds were healing slowly, but that he hoped soon to be fully recovered, and that he might return to the firing lines. Mr. Wright states that although he has written his son several times, the latter states that he has received no mail whatsoever. When he left Kingston, his wife was in the general hospital, recovering from a serious operation. This worried him much. Mrs. Wright is fully recovered and is now with friends at Cataract.

TO ENLARGE USEFULNESS OF Queen Street Methodist Church—Scheme Adopted.

A congregational meeting of Queen Street Methodist church was held on Wednesday evening, in the Sunday school hall, when a committee presented a report on various subjects suggested by the pastor and others, with a view of extending and enlarging the usefulness of the church. It was decided to have a question box. Rev. Dr. Gordon, of Ottawa, recently made this a feature, and it has been found very useful to the congregation. Any question of social or civic interest will have a candid reply.

A reception committee will be appointed. The heads of eight departments will be the executive committee of the church. A lantern will be provided for use of the Sunday school and the societies. On one evening a week there will be a social programme in charge of the young members and it is intended to develop this idea along new lines. Refreshments were served by the Ladies' Aid Society.

THE SPORT REVIEW

Varsity Rugby Champions Weakened Through Injuries

St. Michael's College, Intermediate Canadian Rugby union champions went through the season without a defeat. Boxing is stopped in England, and no championship contests will be held in 1915 unless the war halts. Justice Kelly, who heard the Toronto Rugby and Athletic association's motion to restrain the O. R. C. from granting the championship to the Hamilton Rowing Club, will not give his decision until he has heard the other side.

Leaming Carr, who figured on the Varsity back division this season, has announced his retirement from the game, and followed it up by not turning out to practice since the McGill game. All arrangements made by McGill with Yale in connection with the hockey games which it had been proposed to play towards the middle of December have been cancelled owing to financial difficulties.

Ottawa Journal: Frank McGee, the former Ottawa centre forward, is hard in training with the Forty-third recruits at Kingston. He is a lieutenant in the second Canadian Expeditionary force. If Frank fights with the scouts, he will be into the Germans.

The condition of the Varsity Rugby team is one which is causing concern among its followers, owing to three of the regulars being on the crippled list. Cassels broke a bone in his hand in the last McGill match, and has been unable to take part in any of the scrimmages in the work-out, while Sheehy is still suffering from a sprained wrist. Then Len Lindsay, the half-back, tore a ligament in his foot.

Toronto Star: The news that Scotty Davidson, the Kingston hockey player, had won the boxing championship of the first Canadian contingent is denied by Pte. Dan M. Douglas of the 46th regiment, Port Hope, who writes that Gordon H. Grahame, a member of the 46th Regiment, of Port Hope, fought his way through to the finals with Davidson, but that Davidson was unable to fight the final owing to a broken hand.

"The best hockey played in Canada won't be playing this winter, and I don't mean Art Ross," was the summary of a statement made by Coach Alf. Smith of the Ottawa hockey club, who styles Allen Davidson, the big Kingston wing man of last year's Toronto team as the best player in the game. Smith claims Davidson did the most effective skating of any player in the N.H.A. last winter, and a host of the hockey fans of the capital agree with him.
