RED CROSS WORK DONE

BY THE WOMEN OF KINGSTON AND DISTRICT.

The Many Articles That Have Been Prepared For the Soldiers Are Enumerated.

Many no doubt read in Monday's issue the article headed "Making Benevolence More Practical," really an advertisement published through-out Canada, seeking to continue the making of soldier comforts to paid labor, on the plea of furnishing employment to thousands of unemployed expert seamstresses and factories in Canada, who turn these things out as a matter of business. In large cities the number of unemployed may be great enough to require consideration, although in some cases the class available proved to be anything but expert in sewing or knitting, and where subscriptions run up into the thousands such a scheme no doubt could be financed.

But in Kingston, although the contributions to the Red Cross society have been generous, considering the many calls on the people, the total amounts are only about adequate to keep up with the expenditure for materials alone.

Moreover, the class of work done, viz.: Hospital supplies, dressings, bandages, also army shirts and hand-knitted socks for hospital use, soldier comforts for men in active service, such as wristlets, Balacava caps, cholera bands, all knitted, is not necessarily the kind of work to be undertaken by the unemployed most generally available.

When the Red Cross was formed here in August the members were the president, Mrs. J. E. Martin; hon. secretary, Miss M. Redden; hon. treasurer, Miss Macdonell, and committee in charge of hospital supplies work at the rooms, and sewing and knitting undertaken by people through out the city in their homes, also church aid societies, St. James, Sydenham Street Methodist church, St. George's mothers' meeting, Cooke's and a halmers churches being among the number.

In October the women of the country districts advised the society of their desire to work if furnished with materials and patterns. It seemed a pity not to utilize such a splendid chance, which although it increased the expenditure, was very considerably, has given tangible and decidedly satisfactory results. There is also another side apparently lost sight of by the Manufacturers' association: the spirit of loving service and patriotism animating everyone to do his or her little share to help these taking part of preparing totak epa rt in the great war now going on, which satisfies in a measure and helps to relieve the tension and stress prevalent everywhere. The following is a list of comforts sent to Valcartier for the soldiers by the Red Cross society.

To Major Hamilton for "A" and "B" batteries, R.C.H.A.—476 Balacava caps; 72 pairs woollen gloves, ten pairs wristlets.

Lieut.-Col. A. E. Ross for Army Medical Corps—59 caps, 19 pairs wristlets, 11 pairs socks, 4 dozen handkerchiefs, 37 mending kits.

Major W. A. Mitchell, A.S.C.—13 caps, 7 pairs wristlets.

Major A. Macphail for Queen's Engineers—31 caps, 35 mending kits.

14th Regiment detachment at Valcartier—20 caps, 40 mending kits, 90 caps were given to the 14th home guard at the fort.

47 Regiment, (Inventory), Capt. Ernest Monck, Salisbury Plain—45 caps, 45 knitted cholera bands, 45 pairs wristlets, 17 pairs socks; 27 mending kits.

Sent to Miss Plummer, Salisbury Plain—235 pairs wristlets, 158 pairs socks, 186 knitted cholera bands, 102 caps, 20 knitted scarves.

Hospital supplies.—The following were sent to the Red Cross depot Quebec to be forwarded: Cotton dressings, sterilized, 560; cotton bandages, different widths, 174 dozen; gauze sponges, sterilized, 540; gauze dressings, sterilized, 304; gauze bandages, sterilized, different widths, 2,362; grey flannel army shirts, 197; night shirts, 78; nightgowns, 42; abdominal bandages, 239; triangular bandages, 1 dozen; medical towels, sterilized, 420; pneumonia jackets, 102; cotton wool pads, 193.

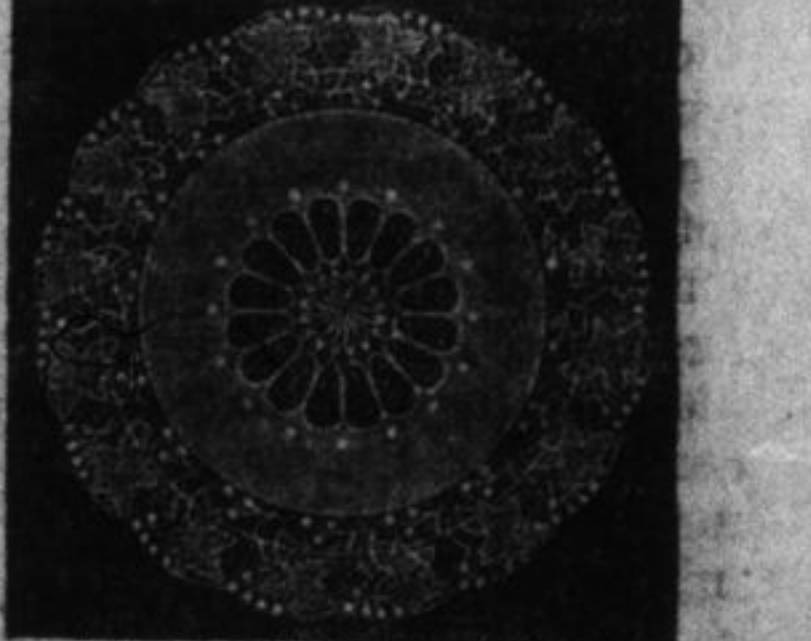

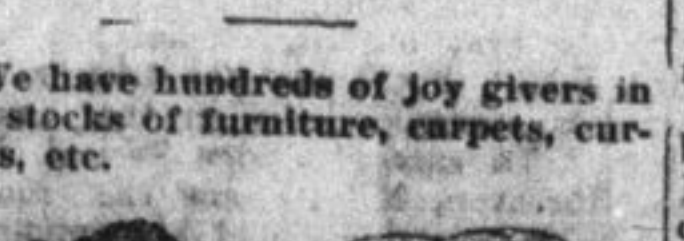
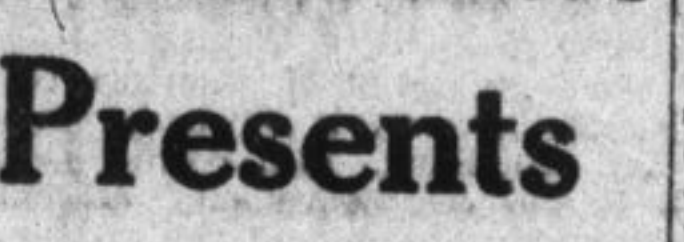
