THE HALLS OF QUEEN'S Lt.-Col. Van Straubenzee Has Joined

INTER YEAR CHAMPIONSHIP DE-

The inter-year championship debate, held in Convocation Hall, on Tuesday afternoon, between '15 and '17, resulted in a win for '17 after a close and exciting oratorical battle. The representatives of '15, A. A. Paoli and J. T. 


