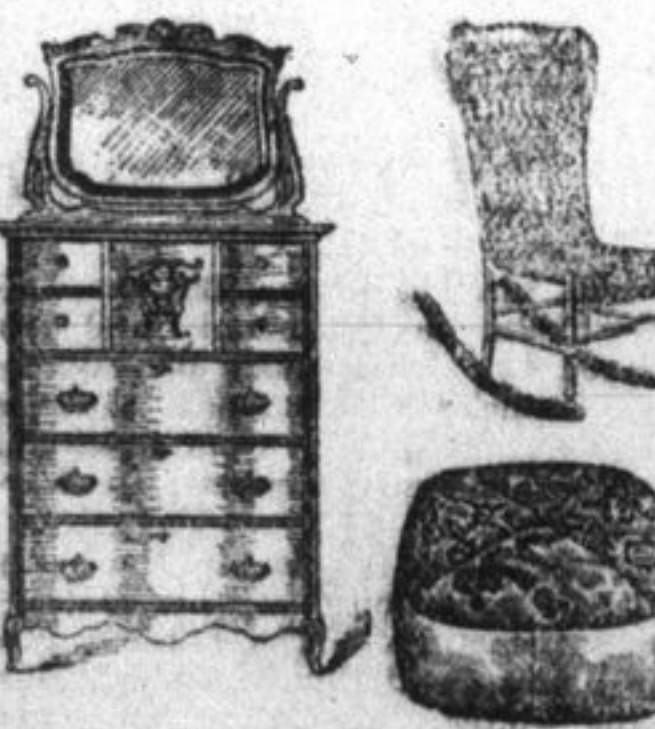

THE HALLS OF QUEEN'S

INTER YEAR CHAMPIONSHIP DEBATE WON BY '17.

Girls of '17 Won Basketball Game—Intercollegiate Debate Between Ottawa and Queen's on Friday Evening.

The inter-year championship debate, held in Convocation Hall, on Tuesday afternoon, between '15 and '17, resulted in a win for '17 after a close and exciting oratorical battle. The affirmative of the subject, "Resolved, that local improvements in Ontario should be exempt from taxation," was taken by the sophomore team composed of J. A. MacLennan and H. C. Knox. The representatives of '15, A. A. Paoli and J. T. McQuay, in taking the negative side, proved that the rich man's vast equipment goes untaxed under the present state of affairs, while the poor man is heavily burdened with taxes. Mr. Paoli, citing Kingston as an example, stated that the improvements were valued at twice the amount of the land and both were taxed at a rate of twenty-five mills. If the tax on the improvements was removed, a rate of seventy-five mills would have to be struck for the land alone.

The '17 men showed that if improvements were exempt then all land would be built upon, and all land in the heart of our cities would be used for the erection of handsome structures. Mr. Knox, of '17, showed that this system had been used successfully in New Zealand since 1895. The judges were Profs. Taylor, Scott and Michel.

The girls' basketball team of Arts '17 strengthened its position at the top of the league by defeating Arts '15 in a very close game on Tuesday afternoon, by a score of 4 to 2. The sophomores assumed the aggressive at the start and never lost their lead during the entire game. '17—Misses Macphail, Wood, Coon, Garrison and Curten. '15—Misses MacDougall, Kilgour, Chown, Guthrie and Graney.

The inter-year basketball games billed for Saturday afternoon were switched to Thursday afternoon at five o'clock, so as not to interfere with the O.T.C. march on Saturday. In the senior series '15 meets '17, while '16 and '17 clash in a junior game.

The first round of the Intercollegiate debates will be held in Convocation Hall on Friday, December 11th at 8 p.m. when the Ottawa College team meets the Queen's representatives.

The subject for debate is: "Resolved, that in the municipalities of Ontario improvements should be exempted from taxation." The affirmative will be taken by Queen's, represented by H. L. Sparkie and J. S. McInnis. Ottawa College always sends a strong team and a good argument is looked for. The winners of this debate will meet Varsity in the finals, McGill having defaulted to Toronto.

The first meeting of the committee of the Political Science club will be held on Wednesday evening at the home of Prof. W. L. Grant.

The Y.M.C.A. meeting on Wednesday afternoon in Convocation Hall will be addressed by one of the students, Stanley Corbett, M.A., who will speak on "Faith, Unfaith and the Student."

The Senate has arranged to inaugurate a series of lectures in connection with classes given by the department of agriculture. These classes, including English, chemistry, physics, botany, mathematics, animal biology and elocution will begin after Christmas and run for a period of eight weeks.

Last week the Board of Works pay list contained the names of 100 laborers but this week the number will be reduced by probably forty, as the road work is completed for the year. Sewers are also about finished. There are a number of men working in the stone quarry, where they are making fifty per cent. more than last year in breaking stone by hand. One of the laborers made about \$2 by his work on Monday. There are few who cannot make over a dollar a day.

TO COMMAND ENGINEERS.

Lt.-Col. Van Straubenzee Has Joined Canadians at Salisbury.

A London cable states that Lieut.-Col. A. H. Straubenzee has taken command of the Engineers with the Canadian contingent at Salisbury Plain.

Although born in England (in 1861) he was educated at Trinity College School, Port Hope, and was graduated from the Royal Military College at Kingston in 1880. He was first attached to the Bengal Engineers but soon was made lieutenant in the Royal Engineers, and in 1906 became lieutenant-colonel. For seven years (1886-93) he was instructor at the Royal Military College, and from 1894-8 was assistant instructor at the school for military engineering at Chatham, Eng. From 1904-5 he commanded the fort at Trincomali, Ceylon, and was later in Bermuda.

Capt. Charles Van Straubenzee, of Toronto, now with the Royal Canadian Dragoons at Salisbury, is a brother, and so is Major Van Straubenzee, instructor of the school of gunnery at Shoeburyness, England. Major Bowen Van Straubenzee, retired, is another brother. Their mother resides on Beverly street, in this city.

HOME NURSING.

A Course Of Lectures Are To Be Given.

The first lecture of the course in "Home Nursing," in connection with the St. John Ambulance Association, will be held in the clinic-room of the general hospital on Friday at three o'clock. Miss Bailey will give the first lecture. This course is open to all ladies over sixteen years of age who have already received a certificate in first aid. Its purpose is to acquaint them with a few of the main principles of nursing such as preparation of a sick room, care of a patient, application of local remedies, the use of the roller bandages, etc. Text books will be furnished to members of the class. The course consists of five lectures. Owing to the regrettable delay in obtaining text books on first aid, the St. John Association is unable to begin work in that subject with the classes already organized.

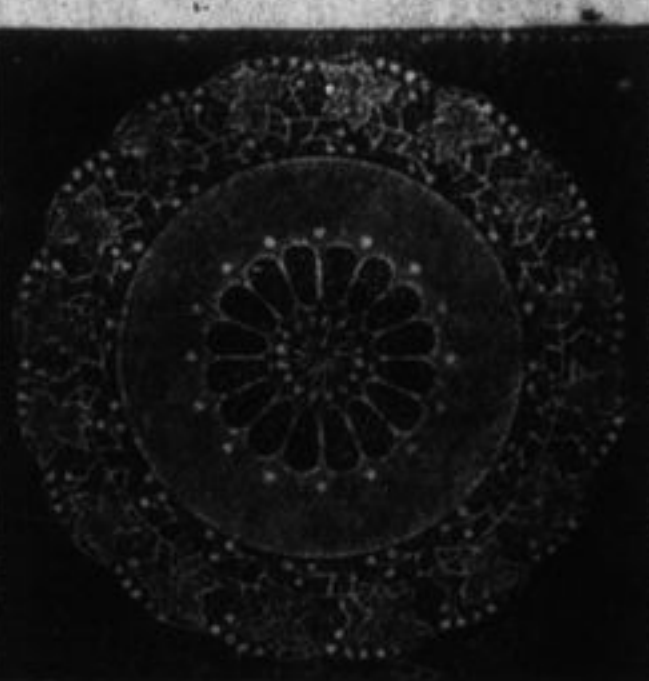
