There are four companies of double the strength, or 215 men in each company. Each of the four companies is under four subalterns, usually · lieutenants, a captain and an officer in charge, either a senior captain or a major. This makes four maj-ors or senior captains to the battalion under the command of a lieu-

tenant-colonel. It was generally thought by mili-tia men that the old drill order would be kept on as the larger companies are rather difficult to handle The battalion has been to date drilling under the old system and this

No orders have yet been received to commence the recruiting for the third contingent of the Canadian expeditionary force. The place where it will be mobilized in the division has not yet been stated. The minister of militia is in the maritime provinces on an inspection trip and it is not likely that orders will be issued until he retusns.

It is unlikely that the 22nd overseas battery will leave the city for the front before March at least, is the opinion among officers here. The order to leave will, of course, come only a very short time before, but for several reasons this order is not expected until the last of February or the first of March. The visual signalling is more or less limited to conditions; the field telephones are used at times when the other is not possible. A "ground-spike" is driven into the ground and from this a wire is connected to the instrument. A horse and rider then take a coil of small wire and lays the wire along the ground to the other instrument. The telephone is very compact, being carried over the shoulder with no greater difficulty than a camera. Each telephone is in a leather case with the receiver and transmitter separate. A buzzer is also in the case and this is used to call the other party. If for any reason the telephone does not work clear enough, the buzzer is used as a telegraph Instrument, and the Morse code used to send the mes-






