25-HOURS IN AIR BIPLANE.

Milan Trial Showed It Could 3,500 Pounds

Milan, via Rome, Dec. 11.-A nev military biplane which, it is estimat ed, can lift 3,300 pounds and remain in the air 25 hours, was given a suc cessful trial here. The machine has three motors, which develop an aggregate of 300 horse power, and it is said the craft can attain a speed of 75 miles an hour. It will carry a 125-millimetre gun. On its trial to-day the machine rose to a height of 6,500 feet.
