Conversation To Be Held On 15th January - Presentations To Be Given by the Overseas Contingent.

The service at Convocation Hall on Sunday morning was taken by the Rev. Prof. Dall, who took his text from II Corinthians, IV, 18: "The things which are seen are temporal, but the things which are not seen are eternal."

These words were spoken by a great man at the outset of the greatest struggle in history, and the Christians were facing the task of winning the world for their master.

All outward things are after all the things which matter least, and the inward things which no man has seen, are the ones that matter most.
