CONSTABLE ASSAULTED

WHEN HE WAS ABOUT TO ARREST A YOUNG MAN.

William Conway Given Month in Jail And His Brother Percy Two Months — Police Recovered Stolen Money.

Found guilty on a charge of stealing fourteen potato bags from Joseph Abramsky, Princess street, William Conway was on Monday morning sentenced to one month in jail by Magistrate Farrell. His brother, Percy Conway, was also charged with having a hand in the theft, and was also given a month. He got an extra month for having assaulted Police Constable Jenkins.

The constable noticed William Conway, coming out of a laneway near Abramsky's store with the bags and notified the owner of the store. Abramsky identified the bags as his property and caught hold of the youth. Constable Jenkins then took him in charge. After he did so, Percy Conway took objection and hit the constable on the head. Two soldiers assisted the constable in getting the two young men to the police station.

Frank Inchman was accused of stealing money from his companion, a young man named Robertson. The two have been sailing on the lakes and came down from Port Arthur on Saturday night. They secured a room at a local hotel. Yesterday morning, while the two were in the room, Robertson took a "nap" and while he slept his wad, amounting to \$22, disappeared. He notified the police and Constables Bateson and Naylor who investigated, rounded up Inchman and the money was found on him. Inchman, however, stated that the accused must be stealing the money.

"I thought it was my own he said, 'if I wanted to steal it I could have taken the money from him in the night and got away.'"

He asked for a chance, stating that it was near Christmas, and he wanted to get to his home which is in New York state.

It appeared that the two men had been drinking and the magistrate in summing up the case, stated that it did not appear as if Inchman had intended to steal the money, and therefore dismissed the case but stated that the accused must be careful of his drinking would get him into serious trouble.

"Let one of the constables take me down to the 'bin' for Canada," said Frederick Ormiston, in the drunkennes. Ormiston comes to court altogether too often and the magistrate paid no attention to him.

A fine of \$2, and costs or one month was imposed.

William Heath, another drunk, was fined \$2, and costs and a first appearance man was given a chance.

ORDERED TO EGYPT.

Major Leslie Has Had His Marching Orders.

On Friday night William Leslie received a cablegram from his son, Major W. B. Leslie, deputy adjutant general at Delhi, India, stating that he had been ordered to Egypt and that his wife was sailing for England at once. Major Leslie has seen service in Somaliland and has had considerable experience in handling Indian troops. It is likely he will be in command of some of these in the campaign against Turkey. Major Leslie is a graduate of the Royal Military College, and has made good in his chosen profession.

Canadian School Cadet Corps.

The number of school cadets in the Dominion is increasing rapidly. Manitoba has the largest percentage of cadets to the number of pupils in the schools, their percentage being 4.94. The number of cadets between the ages of twelve and eighteen years of age on the 24th of May last and what percentage that number is of the total school attendance for the province was published in the latest militia orders. The list is as follows:

Manitoba, 4,146 cadets, 4.94 per cent.; Alberta, 3,778 cadets, 4.75 per cent.; Quebec, 13,148 cadets, 4.39 per cent.; Ontario, 14,610 cadets, 2.56 per cent.; Prince Edward Island, 1,471 cadets, 2.63 per cent.; British Columbia, 1,493 cadets, 2.59 per cent.; Saskatchewan, 1,377 cadets, 2.14 per cent.; Nova Scotia, 1,675 cadets, 1.54 per cent.; New Brunswick, 753 cadets, 1.2 per cent.

German Mines Near Sweden

Stockholm, Dec. 14.—The Swedish minister of foreign affairs gave out a statement with regard to the recent sinking of three Swedish steamers, as the result of striking mines in the Gulf of Bothnia.

"The Germans," the foreign minister says, "declare that the mines were Russian, as no German mine-sweeping had been done up to the time of the disaster. Official investigations made by Finland disclose that several groups of anchored mines were German and not Russian, and that they had been laid during the war in the Gulf of Bothnia. No Russian mines, it was stated, had been found."

THROW NO PEELINGS OR SCRAPS AWAY

German Population Urged to Cook Potatoes With the Skins on.

Biele, Dec. 14.—The Prussian minister of commerce has issued a proclamation urging the population to cook potatoes in the skins so as to save the loss due to peeling when raw.

"Throw no peelings or other scraps away," he says.

Mutiny in Turkish Fleet.

Athens, Dec. 14.—Mutiny has broken out among the crews of the Turkish fleet at Constantinople, owing to the long continued brutal conduct of the German officers with the fleet. At the same time, owing to a similar cause, there was a revolt in the barracks at Stambul, in which two German officers were killed.

The anti-German sentiment is increasing among the populace and further disorders are feared.

Arranging The Entertainment.

Already the ladies of the different churches are preparing the programme that will be given the soldiers in the militia Y. M. C. A. on Christmas night. At the meeting on Friday two committees were formed one to look after the programme and the refreshments. Ladies from every church in the city are on the committees and a big programme is planned.

Death of Brockville Man.

Brockville, Dec. 14.—Charles Flanagan, the Montreal man who attempted suicide by jumping into the St. Lawrence river while visiting friends in Maitland village, died at the Eastern Hospital for the Insane, to which he was committed for treatment following his rash act. He was forty-one years of age and a native of Brockville.

For Raid On England.

London, Dec. 14.—Eighteen super-Zeppelins, according to a representative of the Turin Stamps, who has had access to the sheds at Friedrichshafen, are being prepared to take part in an attack on Great Britain in the spring. The correspondent says that every three weeks an airship leaves the Zeppelin hangars for a secret destination.

C. P. B. Changes.

The morning train over the C.P.R. leaves the city at 11.15 o'clock now instead of 11.25, so as to make connections with the main line train at Tichborne Junction. The change went into effect to-day.

The name of Parham Junction on this line has been changed to Tichborne Junction.
