MAY BE TRANSFERRED
COL. HEMMING LIKELY TO GO TO WINNIPEG.

To Take the Command Held By Col. S. B. Steele — Christmas Cheer Will Be Received For the 21st Battalion.

Information has been received to the effect that Col. T. D. R. Hemming, officer commanding of No. 3 divisional area, will be transferred to Winnipeg to take command of District No. 19, which includes the provinces of Manitoba and Saskatchewan and the territory of Keewatin, and the districts of Thunder Bay and Rainy River. Col. S. B. Steele, the late O. C. of this district, has been given the rank of major-general and been made inspector-general of the western provinces. Col. Hemming has always been a very popular and energetic officer, and his transfer would cause keen regret.

Major R. W. Leonard a graduate of the Royal Military College and a resident of St. Catharines, has been gazetted second in command of the new infantry battalion that is to be recruited in Montreal.

Lieut. Col. V. S. Hughes, commanding the 21st battalion, Canadian Expeditionary force, in speaking with the Whip to-day, stated that people had been asking if they make Christmas Cheer donations to the battalion. The colonel stated that

TO HAVE ACCLAMATIONS
And To Use Election Money to Aid Belgians.

Many of the townships throughout Ontario are arranging for the re-election of the present councils by acclamation, and the money that would be spent in an election is to be turned over to the Belgian relief fund. In some counties the amount thus realized would reach in the neighborhood of \$3,000. The example of the western counties should be considered in Frontenac and adjacent counties, and similar action taken. The township councils that have been in office during 1914, have generally served very acceptably, and their continuance in 1915 would not be harmful in any sense. And the result would be a great benefit to the starving Belgians, to whom the allies owe so much in the present war.

County Patriotic Fund Cases.
 The patriotic fund cheque for December has arrived to cover the requisition made by the county branch. There are two cases in the county that are receiving money from the fund, and a third will likely be added in the next requisition. A requisition was made in the last case for the government separation allowance but as the application was made on behalf of the aged parents the amount will have to come from the patriotic fund.

CITY COUNCIL VACANCIES.

There Will Be Ten Seats To Be Filled in January.

As far as known, there will be ten council seats to be filled at the January elections. Three aldermen have resigned, viz., H. C. Nickle, of Sydenham ward, F. J. Hoar, of Ontario ward, and F. J. Hoar, of Frontenac ward. The seven aldermen who retire by reason of the expiration of their terms are: Ald. Sutherland in Sydenham ward; Ald. O'Connor, in Ontario ward; Ald. Gillespie, in St. Lawrence ward; Ald. Stroud, in Cataract ward; Ald. Peters, in Frontenac ward; Ald. Clugston, in Rideau ward, and Ald. Litton, in Victoria ward.

Ald. Sutherland is mayoralty candidate, so there will be two elections in Sydenham ward as well as in Ontario and Frontenac wards. It is understood that Ald. Peters will not run again.
