GOODS HELD TILL NEEDED

CAUGHT WITH GOODS

AMOS GREEN WAS GIVEN SIX MONTHS FOR THEFT

Arrested Late Wednesday Night For Stealing From Wholesale of Robertson, Nicolle & Co. — Green's Companion Escaped.

While Amos Green, a young man, was being tried in the police court, on Thursday morning, on a charge of theft, his wife and two small children waited in one of the police rooms to hear the result of the case. Green was found guilty and sentenced by Magistrate Farrell to six months in jail.

He was arrested shortly after eleven o'clock on Wednesday night, by Constable Clark, charged with the theft of tobacco from Robertson, Nicolle & Co., wholesale grocers, Ontario street. He pleaded "not guilty" and his case was quickly disposed of. The goods stolen were placed on a table before the magistrate and consisted of one caddie of Napoleon tobacco, one-half caddie of Pay Roll, one-half caddie of T. & B. and one caddie of Black Watch. One of the shippers at the wholesale was sworn, and identified the tobacco as belonging to this wholesale.

Constable Clark was called to the box, and told his story of the arrest of Green.

"About eleven o'clock Wednesday night," said the constable, "I was on Ontario street. When I stopped for a minute or two. While standing there I noticed the prisoner and another man come along the railway tracks. Green had three caddies of tobacco in a bag and the rest of the tobacco was carried by the other fellow, under his arm. When they saw me both dropped the tobacco and ran. I followed Green to Princess street. Two soldiers happened to come along and I called out to them to stop him. They did so and then I put Green under arrest. The other fellow escaped."

Green asked the magistrate to remand his case for a week, declaring that he was not the guilty party in the case.

"No, I will not remand you for a week," replied the magistrate. "The evidence against you is quite clear. You were caught with the goods."

The prisoner said that he met his friend and that the latter had asked him to carry the tobacco.

"But in that case you were a party to it," remarked the magistrate. "You should not have touched the tobacco at all. I will sentence you to six months."

After Green was arrested Constables Clark and Naylor paid a visit to the wholesale and they found how the men had secured entrance to the building. They got in through the door of the lane. A wire screen had been pried off and then a pane of glass had been smashed. After this it was a very easy matter to get a hand in and push the door so that the door would open. While making an inspection inside the wholesale, a half dozen or so burnt matches were found on the floor having been used by the men in search for the tobacco. It is a wonder they did not set fire to the wholesale.

Mary Nelson was charged with being the keeper of a disorderly house, but she denied the charge and asked for a chance to secure a lawyer. She afterwards had a consultation with T. J. Rigney and the case was set for hearing on Monday next.

John Slattery was arrested for drunkenness and vagrancy. He pleaded guilty to being drunk, but protested against the other charge. He said he belonged to Ottawa, and that he had only been in the city four days. Sergeant Nesbitt said that he had been at the police station for protection three nights. Slattery said he had been working on boats all summer and had left his boat, the Alberta, at Port McNicoll a short time ago. The magistrate imposed a fine of \$2 and costs or fifteen days.

IN MILITARY CIRCLES.

Some News About the Soldiers Going Overseas.

The officers taking the R.S.A. course at Tete de Pont barracks took an examination in "Equitation" on Thursday morning and in the "Use of the Field Instruments," on Thursday afternoon. One of these instruments was shown to the Whig. Two small metallic boxes about as big as a pocket camera can give the distance to an object without measuring. A set of mirrors in each box is the secret. The instruments are held forty yards apart and by the use of the mirrors they are focused on the object that the gun will be ranged on. A small cylinder on the side of each instrument when they are properly focused gives the exact distance to the object which might be many yards away. The mirror adjusting automatically registers the distance to the point of apex of the triangle made by the two instruments, and the object that the gun will be trained on. This is only one of many instruments that the officers must become acquainted with. An examination in fuse-setting is on the programme for Friday morning.

In the latest militia orders the following paragraph appears: "It is notified for information of all ranks that any appointments or promotions in the Canadian Expeditionary forces apply only to such forces and establish right to future rank in the active Militia of Canada."

The official list of the names of the men in the Princess Patricia's Canadian Light Infantry battalion shows that Kingston is only represented by one officer, Lieut. J. P. French, of the R.N.W.M.P. Mrs. French is residing on King street in this city.

Rev. T. T. Shields spoke to the soldiers in the militia Y.M.C.A. on Wednesday night on the "Need of Personal Salvation." He gave a very interesting talk to a large number of soldiers.

Thursday night, as usual, the programme will be arranged by the committee from Queen's. The programmes put on by this committee have all been excellent and the hall is usually filled.

On Friday night, Rev. T. T. Shields speaks for the last time here. He has been very generous with the soldiers giving them short talks at seven o'clock so as to be able to conduct the special services in the Baptist church at eight o'clock on the same evening.

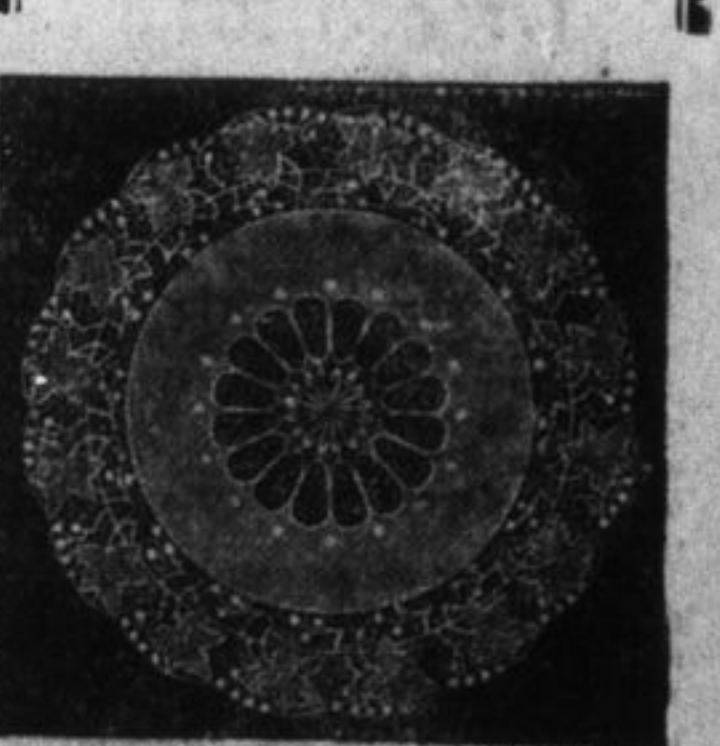
