## KILLED AT CROW LAKE IN MILITARY CIRCLES

### MISS LETITIA COADY VICTIM OF TERRIBLE ACCIDENT.

#### She Either Jumped or Fell Off Train—Awful Injuries Sustained—Died In Fifteen Minutes.

A shocking fatality occurred at Crow Lake on Tuesday, the 15th. The victim was Miss Letitia Coady, aged seventeen years, who was killed by a C.P.R. train. The victim had been down to Parham on a visit, and when returning to her home, in mistake she took the fast express, No. 29, instead of the train for which she had purchased a ticket. The flyer does not make a stop again after leaving Parham until it reaches Smith's Falls, and it seems the unfortunate girl either tried to jump off at her home station or she fell off. Both legs and jaws were broken, and her head was crushed above the right eye. The girl died fifteen minutes after being picked up.

Dr. W. J. Geddes was summoned to the scene, and after inspecting the remains placed them in charge of the city constable. An inquest will be conducted on Wednesday, December 23rd at Crow Lake by Coroner Dr. Geddes. The survivors of the dead girl are her parents and five brothers.

### THE R. S. A. COURSE HAS BEEN COMPLETED.

#### Sixty-five Officers Took It—Six More Foreigners Have Been Interned In Fort Henry.

With the exception of five or six officers who are taking final examinations in battery tactics, the R.S.A. course is finished and the officers have returned home. The new course starts on January 3rd and there is already a large number of applications for entrance. The number that can be accommodated in the new course is not yet definitely decided. The accommodations at the barracks are limited and suitable sleeping quarters in private houses are also limited. It is likely that just a few more than took the course just finished will take the new one. Sixty-five was the number of officers in the course just completed.

Six foreigners were brought to Fort Henry on Saturday morning from the west.

Harold McGrayne, Bloomfield, has joined the second contingent for overseas service.

Captain H. H. Post, V.S., has joined the second contingent.

Hugh MacKeachan and George Marple of Renfrew have joined the 21st battalion pipe band. MacKeachan is a giant piper, a native of Argyllshire, in Scotland, where he was a member of the Argyll and Southern Highlanders, now at the front.

Trooper A. L. McDonald, of the "C" squadron Alexandria, of the 5th P.L.R.G., who has been attending the cavalry school at Hurlingham has been transferred to the 21st battalion at Kingston, training for the second contingent. He will serve as a piper.

The soldiers who are being allowed home for Christmas on furlough will be given leave for four days. Forty per cent. more of the 21st battalion will be given leave, making eighty per cent. in all.

At the militia Y.M.C.A. on Saturday night an excellent programme is promised the soldiers. Sergt. Mar- taugh, and Ptes. Northey and McDonald will give solos, Pte. Nicholson will give a mouth-organ selection, and Sergt. Sterling will give a piano solo.

On Sunday at 8.15 p.m. Rev. G. I. Campbell will conduct a short service to the soldiers. On Monday night the veterans will use the hall for a reception to the officers. On Tuesday night the members of Synodan Street Methodist Church are putting on an entertainment. Thursday as usual the committee from Queen's will look after the programme and on Friday night the big entertainment for the week is to be given to the soldiers. The ladies from every church in the city are operating to make an extensive programme on that evening and refreshments will be served.

### HAD NARROW ESCAPE.

#### Kingstonian, Chum of Dead Operator At Whitty Fired At.

Further particulars have been received regarding Henry Birmingham, the Kingstonian, who was fired at by an Italian at Whitty, reference to which was made in Friday's Whig. It appears that Birmingham was a chum of William Stone, the G.T.R. operator, who was murdered at his post a few nights ago. Birmingham says that on Tuesday night he was shot at from an Italian shack about a mile and a half from the G.T.R. east of Whitty. According to his story he was repairing a signal bell at the G.T.R. crossing when a bullet whizzed past his head. He said that a few minutes before he had seen a couple of Italians standing at the door of the shack. Birmingham made for home after being shot at and reported the case to Chief Macdrotty.
