## VOICE OF THE PULPIT CHRISTMAS SERVICES

ORDINATION SERVICE IN ST. GEORGE'S CATHEDRAL. HELD IN SEVERAL CHURCHES ON SUNDAY.

**Gift Service of the Children — Y. M. C. A. Bible Class Had Supper Sunday Evening and Marched to Bethel Church.**

At the Sunday morning service in St. George's Cathedral Messrs. S. F. Tackerberry, of Jasper; J. Cantrell, of Mallorytown, and H. G. O. Lyodd, of Tweed, were ordained by the Bishop of Kingston. Dean Starr, the Archdeacons of Ontario and Kingston, Canon Groat, Capt. the Rev. W. F. Kidd, Rev. Sydenham Lindsay and Rev. Walter Cox, of Gananoque, took part in the service.

Rev. Mr. Cox preached a very interesting and instructive sermon, outlining the responsibility of a priest to his generation. He spoke of the help he was assured of from God and the courage he constantly must remind himself of as necessary to the carrying out of his divine commission. The Bishop celebrated holy communion after the ordination. Dean Starr was greeter and Rev. Mr. Lindsay was epistoler.

**Brock Street Methodist**  
Interesting services were held in Brock Street Methodist Church on Sunday. In the morning the congregation had the pleasure of listening to Rev. William Jackson, D.D., of Montreal, who delivered an interesting sermon based upon II Corinthians ii, 18: "But we all, with open face beholding as in a glass the glory of the Lord, are changed into the same image from glory to glory, even as by the spirit of the Lord."

Special Christmas music marked the evening service. Fifty voices took part, including the Misses Frances Davies, Myrtle Stagg, Mrs. W. Drury and J. N. Gibson as soloists. The former sweetly sang "The Star of Bethlehem." The choir rendered the anthem, "Glory to God in the Highest."

**St. George's Gift Service.**  
The annual "gift service" held by the scholars of St. George's Sunday School, was enthusiastically responded to on Sunday afternoon from three until four o'clock. The service was held in the cathedral and as each pupil entered he or she cheerfully placed a gift in the large box at the entrance to be used in promoting cheer in many of the poor homes of the city. Dean Starr, Rev. Sydenham Lindsay were in charge of the service and the former delivered an inspiring address. His topic was based upon "Christmas Morn," which was deeply appreciated by young and old. Christmas hymns closed the afternoon's programme.  
On Wednesday evening at 6.30 o'clock the annual Christmas tree for the primary department of the Sunday school will be held.

**Marched to Bethel Church.**  
The early Sunday morning Bible classes for boys have of late been creating considerable interest at the Y.M.C.A. On Sunday morning F. G. Lockett addressed the meeting, and on Sunday evening at six o'clock the same body sat down to supper together in the Y.M.C.A. rooms. Then the class marched to Bethel Congregational church to be present at the evening service. Rev. A. Mershon preached on "Christmas." S. Lilly, boy's secretary, looked after the class.

**NO AGREEMENT MADE.**  
Between J. M. Campbell and Hydro-Electric Commission.

The Hydro-Electric commission has notified the City Council that no agreement has yet been entered into with J. M. Campbell for a supply of Kingston Mills power for this city. The 15th of December was the date fixed by the council for the agreement to be completed. However, the commission has hopes that an arrangement will be arrived at shortly. The delay is with regard to the price, Mr. Campbell wanting 3-4 cents a kilo-watt-hour, and the commission offering only 3-5 cents.

While turning the corner of King and Princess streets in a cutter on Sunday night, about nine o'clock, a young man and woman had the misfortune to be dumped out. The horse was running at a pretty good rate of speed and in turning, the sleigh runner caught in the street railway track.
