UTILITIES COMMISSION

CONCLUDED THE YEAR'S BUSINESS MONDAY AFTERNOON.

Hope Expressed That T. J. Rigney and R. H. Toye Would Be Re-Elected To the Commission By the People.

The Utilities Commission held its last meeting of the year on Monday afternoon. When business was concluded a resolution was passed expressing the appreciation of the other three members of the valuable services rendered by T. J. Rigney as chairman. Under Mr. Rigney's direction, the commission has done splendid work during the year.

The hope was expressed by J. H. Birkett that the two retiring members, Mr. Rigney and R. H. Toye, would be returned by acclamation, and Mayor Shaw expressed the same wish.

Ald. Sutherland and Graham, of the Fire and Light committee, waited upon the commission and asked that they be supplied with figures in connection with the reduction of the number of lights along the "white way" route. The desire of the City Council seems to be that the number of lights should be reduced, as the cost is too great.

R. E. Burns and J. O. Hutton asked the commission to take advantage of the sewer excavation in Victoria street, between Earl and Union streets, by laying gas and water pipes in the same trench under the local improvement plan. Immediate action is necessary. The request of the petitioners was granted.

The commission held over the bill of J. F. Reid, of Windsor, for \$1,025 for repairs to permanent pavement, until it is checked over by the foreman employed by the commission to oversee the work.

Tenders will be called for three years' oil supply. It is hoped to get oil at a figure under five cents a gallon.

General Manager Folger informed the commission that he had three cases of plumbers turning on water at houses without the authority of the utilities department. He intimated that if

plumbers continued that practice they would be summoned before the police magistrate.

The commission discussed the question of clerical assistance for the light and water collectors in the city treasury department. The present arrangement was considered unsatisfactory, and steps will be taken to have a re-arrangement.

It was decided to notify the city clerk that there will be two vacancies on the Utilities Commission at the end of the year. T. J. Rigney and R. H. Toye are the retiring members. A letter was received from the city solicitor, written at the chairman's request, stating that the seat of Dr. A. E. Ross, who is with the Canadian contingent overseas, was vacant, according to law, as the doctor had been absent over three months. The vacancy, for the unexpired portion of the two-year term, will be filled by the City Council.
