BLOCK KIEL CANAL

REPORTED ATTEMPT TO BE MADE BY BRITAIN.

To Sink Old Merchant Vessels and Bottle up German Fleet For Rest of the War.

New York, Dec. 23.—A passenger arriving here on the White Star liner Baltic from Liverpool brought with him details which confirm the story current recently to the effect that the British admiralty was planning to take them to the mouth of the Kiel canal and sink them there, and thus bottle up effectively the German fleet, rendering the Atlantic free from the menace of German commerce-raiders during the remainder of the war.

The passenger, told of the fitting-out of fifty "dummy" warships at Belfast, under the direction of Capt. H. J. Haddock, R.N.R., formerly commander of the White Star liner Olympic. These vessels are old steamships of various tonnage and speed, from the former Cunard Campania, with a speed of nineteen knots, to the tramp which cannot make more than eight knots with a gale of wind behind her.

"These vessels," he said, "are to be manned by volunteers who will take their lives in their hands, as there is the danger of foundering in heavy seas, in addition to that of being shelled and sunk by the enemy. The admiralty has had no difficulty in getting officers and men for the job. The applications have already exceeded the number required to handle the reconstructed craft. All the men would have double pay, I was told, and the officers who have volunteered from the navy would risk their lives for the honor to be gained."

FLOUR TO BRITISH GUIANA

Canada's Exportation Leads to Customs' Dent Change.

Ottawa, Dec. 22.—As a result of the large quantity of Canadian flour that has been imported into British Guiana since the Canadian reciprocity treaty with the West Indies went into force, a change has been made in the customs regulations of that country. The effect of the change is that hereafter goods from Canada passing through New York must be bonded through and not re-shipped at any port. It is not unlikely that some of the other large West Indian colonies may take similar action. The change has been made in order to protect the customs department of British Guiana, since while part of the flour import has come from Halifax on Royal Mail steamers, part has also come by way of New York.

The import of Canadian flour into British Guiana since the reciprocity agreement has been steadily increasing, last year's import being valued at \$657,022.

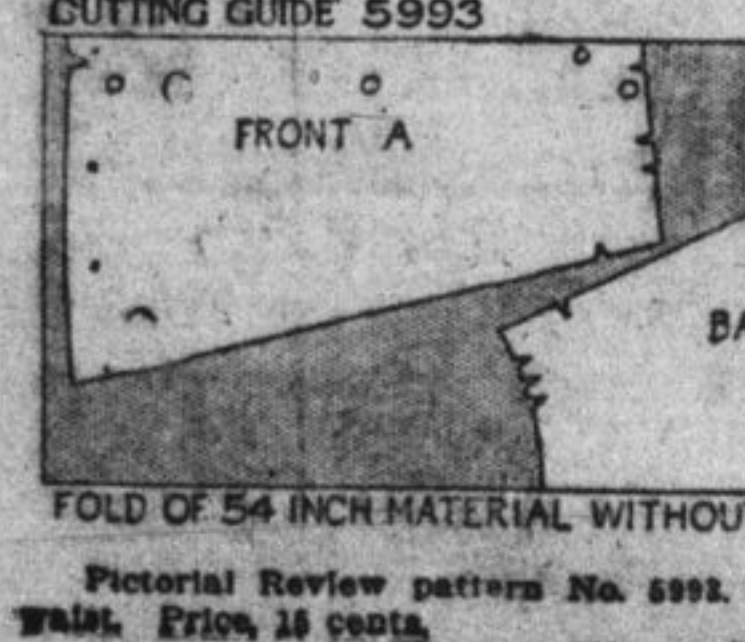
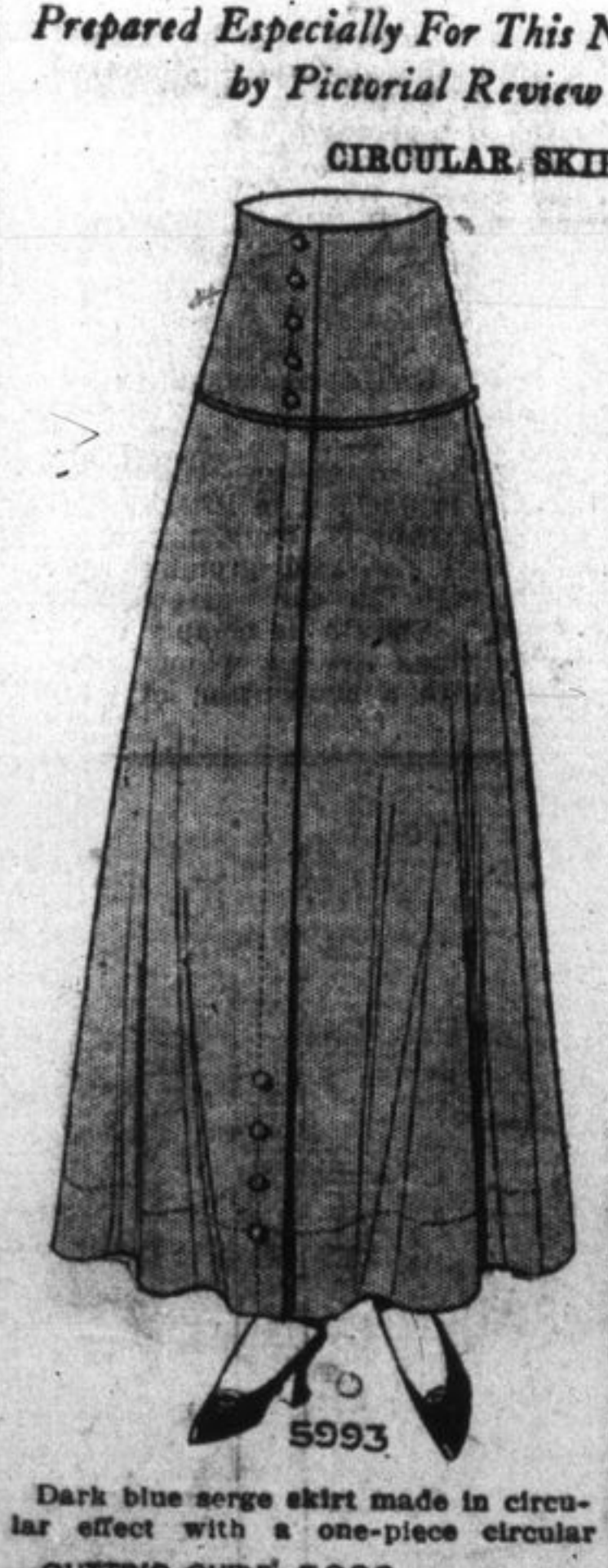

WILL NOT SHIELD DISHONOR

So Baby Killers of Scarborough Will Learn

London, Dec. 22.—The mayor of Scarborough, in a letter replying to the message of Winston Spencer Churchill, first lord of the admiralty, expressing the sympathy of himself and of the British navy at the losses sustained through the German bombardment of Scarborough says: "It is evident that the enemy do not dare face our fleet, and so attacked an undefended town. In this way Scarborough has taken her part in the struggle that is now proceeding. While we deplore the loss of life and property, mourn for our dead, and sympathize with our wounded, we nevertheless are as fully determined as ever that the war must be fought to a successful finish.

"Our surprise at the attack was greater, as we had been led to believe from the conduct of the plucky commander of the Emden that German sailing would do something about the glorious old traditions of the sea. It is evident from our experiences of Wednesday that this is not so. Some new-comers into honorable professions first learn the tricks, and lastly the traditions. As their commanders get older, in the service they will find that the Iron Cross pinned on their breast will not shield them from the shafts of shame and dishonor."

SCANDINAVIAN UNION.

Diplomat Believes It Would Weaken German Influence.

Petrograd, Dec. 23.—The recent conference at Malmo, Sweden, of the Scandinavian kings, and a visit which King Gustav is reported to have made to Berlin previously, constitutes a subject of much interest in Russia, in view of the suggestion of a Scandinavian union. This circum-baltic union of 25,000,000 population, would, according to the alleged German view, become an important European power, while the Scandinavian countries separately, despite their high cultural and industrial development would be politically insignificant.

A Russian diplomat discussing this plan said: "Excluding our provinces, which Germany never will be able to offer the union, Russia favors such a Scandinavian union, although apparently Germany is inspired in accordance with her aim to create several buffer states between herself and Russia. A strong United Scandinavia would weaken German influence on the Baltic."

REPUUDIATES THE LIE.

No Agreement Between Britain and Belgium Against Germany.

New York, Dec. 23.—E. Hevenith, Belgian minister to the United States, who is in this city, issued a statement dealing with certain documents which are said to have been found in the Belgian government archives at Brussels by German officials. Concerning these papers, which as he puts it, "The German government claims prove that Belgium violated her neutrality," the minister said: "The Belgian minister is unable to see how it can be said that these documents constitute a proof of an agreement between England and Belgium against Germany, unless one accepts the idea that the Germans had a right to violate Belgium's neutrality, and that all measures taken as a precaution against violation of neutrality must therefore have been taken against Germany."

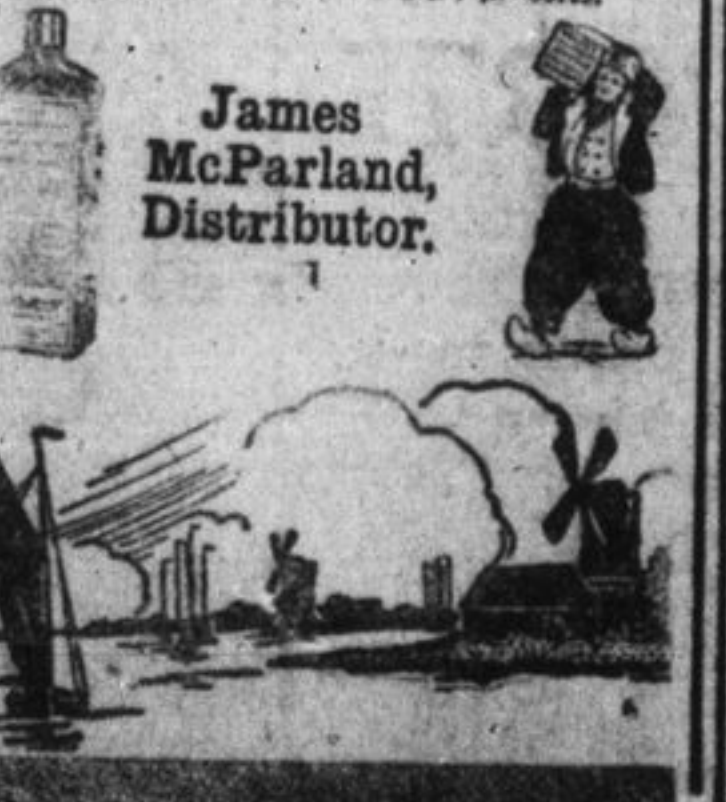
