A BY-LAW TO RATIFY AND CONFIRM AN AGREEMENT WITH THE GANANOQUE ELECTRIC LIGHT & POWER SUPPLY COMPANY, LIMITED.

BY-LAW TO RATIFY AND CONFIRM AN AGREEMENT WITH THE GANANOQUE ELECTRIC LIGHT & POWER SUPPLY COMPANY, LIMITED.

SCHEDULE A. THIS AGREEMENT made in duplicate this 23rd day of December, A.D. 1914, between The Corporation of the City of Kingston, hereinafter called the Corporation, and The Gananoque Electric Light & Power Supply Company, Limited, hereinafter called the Contractors, do hereby certify that the following is the substance of the same.

1. The Corporation hereby grants permission to the Contractors to erect, maintain and repair a single line of electric energy on and along such streets and places within the said City for the transmission of electricity.

2. The Corporation shall within two years from the execution of this agreement develop power at the said scale and transmit electric current to the City of Kingston, and if they fail to do so all the rights conferred on them by this agreement shall be forfeited and void.

3. The electric energy so developed and transmitted shall be used and employed by the said Contractors solely in and about the milling and manufacturing business of the Kingston Milling Company, Limited, upon the premises situated on Ontario Street, between Brook and Princess Streets, in said City, and for operating the Boring mill at the foot of Gore Street.

4. The Contractors shall be liable for all damages arising from the construction and maintenance of any power transmission line that they may be authorized to erect under this agreement, and shall indemnify and save harmless the City from all actions and claims for damages in respect of injuries arising or alleged to arise by reason of the construction and maintenance of said transmission line and the transmission of electric current over and along the same, whether such actions or claims are brought and made in respect of persons or property or existing rights upon the streets of said City.

5. It is further covenanted and agreed that neither the Contractors nor any assignee or transferee shall, in any event, carry or distribute, or permit to be carried or distributed, any light, heat or power beyond the limits of the premises referred to in said Clause 4.

6. The Corporation shall by its Council or by resolution of the Council, at any time, may be pleased to do, shall appoint a committee to be known as the By-Law Committee, and the members of such committee shall be the members of the Council of the City of Kingston, and if they fail to do so all the rights conferred on them by this agreement shall be forfeited and void.

7. The By-Law Committee shall have power to make, amend, alter, vary, revoke, suspend, or annul any By-Law made by the Council of the City of Kingston, and to cause any such By-Law to be printed and distributed to the electors of the City of Kingston, and to receive the assent of the said electors as required by the Municipal Act and the Municipal Franchise Act, and to cause any such By-Law to be published in the Kingston Daily Free Press.

In case the Contractors, after beginning to transmit current to the City of Kingston pursuant to this agreement, shall cease or fail for twelve months continuously to transmit electric current to the City pursuant to the terms of this agreement, or to observe and perform any of the other covenants and conditions contained herein on their part contained, all the rights conferred upon the Contractors by this agreement shall be forfeited and void, and the Corporation may forthwith remove the Contractors' power transmission line from the City streets at the Contractors' expense.

6. The Contractors shall be liable for all damages arising from the construction and maintenance of any power transmission line that they may be authorized to erect under this agreement, and shall indemnify and save harmless the City from all actions and claims for damages in respect of injuries arising or alleged to arise by reason of the construction and maintenance of said transmission line and the transmission of electric current over and along the same, whether such actions or claims are brought and made in respect of persons or property or existing rights upon the streets of said City.

3. On the 5th day of January, 1915, at the hour of two o'clock in the City Clerk's Office, in the said Municipality, the Clerk of said Municipality shall attend and sum up the votes given for and against the proposed By-Law.
