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A BY-LAW TO RATIFY AND CONFIRM AN AGREEMENT WITH THE GANANOQUE ELECTRIC LIGHT & POWER SUPPLY COMPANY, LIMITED.

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SCHEDULE A. THIS AGREEMENT made in duplicate this 23rd day of December, A.D. 1914, between The Corporation of the City of Kingston, hereinafter called the Corporation, and The Gananoque Electric Light & Power Supply Company, Limited, hereinafter called the Contractors.

Whereas the said Contractors have represented that they are about to develop the water power at Kingston Mills and convert the same into electric energy for use as power.

And whereas it is expedient to grant permission to said Contractors to erect and maintain a single line of electric energy on and along such streets and places within the said City for the transmission of electricity.

The Corporation shall within two years from the execution of this agreement develop power at the said site and transmit electric current to the City of Kingston, and if they fail to do so all the rights conferred on them by this agreement shall be forfeited and void.

in and about the milling and manufacturing business of the Kingston Milling Company, Limited, upon the premises situated on Ontario Street, between Brook and Princess Streets, in said City, and for operating the Boring mill at the foot of Gore Street.

6. The Contractors shall be liable for all damages arising from the construction and maintenance of any power transmission line that they may be authorized to erect under this agreement, and shall indemnify and save harmless the City from all actions and claims for damages in respect of injuries arising or alleged to arise by reason of the construction and maintenance of said transmission line and the transmission of electric current over and along the same, whether such actions or claims are brought and made in respect of persons or property or existing rights upon the streets of said City.

7. It is further covenanted and agreed that neither the Contractors nor any assignee or transferee shall, in any event, carry or distribute, or permit to be carried or distributed, any light, heat or power beyond the limits of the premises referred to in said Clause 4.

8. The permission hereby granted to the Contractors shall, subject as herein provided, extend and continue for and during the period of thirty years from the 1st day of January, 1915, and no longer; after the expiration of said period the Contractors shall forthwith remove their poles, wires and other appliances from the said streets, and in case the Contractors fail to do so upon request the Corporation may remove the same but at the expense of the Contractors.

9. The Corporation shall by its Council or by resolution of the Council, call a meeting of the electors of the Municipality to vote on any By-law to carry out the terms of this agreement, provided that in case the Corporation, on such submission shall fail to receive the assent of the said electors as required by The Municipal Act and the Municipal Franchise Act, then this agreement and said By-law shall be null and void.

and provided further that in case the said By-law receives the assent of the said electors as by law required the Corporation shall by its Council pass the said By-law, and provided further that before the said By-law is advertised as by law required, the Contractors shall deposit with the Treasurer of the Corporation the sum of Four Hundred Dollars to cover the cost of advertising and submitting the said By-law to the electors.

IN WITNESS WHEREOF the said Corporation hath hereunto affixed its seal and the said Contractors have hereunto set their hands and seals the day and year first above written.

NOTICE. NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN that the foregoing is a true copy of a proposed By-law of the Corporation of the City of Kingston, which has been taken into consideration, and which will be finally passed by the Council of said Corporation in the event of the assent of the electors being obtained thereby.

1. The votes of the electors of the City of Kingston shall be taken on the said proposed By-law at the same hour, on the same day and at the same place as by the same Deputy Returning Officers as for the annual election for the Council for the year 1915.

2. On the 30th day of December, 1914, at the hour of eleven o'clock in the Mayor's office, the head of the Council of the said Corporation or some member of said Council appointed for that purpose by resolution shall attend at said place in the said Municipality, for the purpose of appointing, and if required signing by him, two persons to attend at the final summing up of the votes by the clerk and one person to attend at each polling place on behalf of the persons interested in and desirous of opposing the proposed By-law.

3. On the 5th day of January, 1915, at the hour of two o'clock in the City Clerk's Office, in the said Municipality, the Clerk of said Municipality shall attend and sum up the votes given for and against the proposed By-law.
