Feeders and stockers—Market nominal, no sales reported. Choice steers, \$6.25 to \$6.50; medium steers, \$5.75 to \$6.25; stockers, \$4 to \$5.75. Milkens and springers—Market nominal at \$6.00 each.

Calves—No offerings, but prices would be nominal. Choice veals, \$9 to \$10, common to good, \$5 to \$8.

Sheep, \$1 to \$5; culled and rams, \$2 to \$4; lambs, choice ewes and wethers, \$8 to \$8.50; heavy lambs, \$7 to \$7.50.

Hogs—Unchanged. Selected, fed and watered, \$7.25 to \$6.90 l.o.b. cars, and \$7.50 weighed off cars.
