### WAS HEAVILY FINED

**FOR SELLING LIQUEUR TO SOLDIERS IN HIS LUNCH ROOM.**

Charles Andre Taxed \$200 and Costs With Option of Three Months in Jail—Military Police Made the Arrest.

One of the heaviest fines imposed in the Kingston police court in some time, was imposed on Thursday morning by Magistrate Farrell, when he found Charles Andre guilty of having sold liquor to members of the 21st battalion for excessive profits that taxed him \$200 and costs, with the option of three months in jail. The maximum fine for the offence is \$500. C. E. Webster conducted the prosecution on behalf of the license inspector, C. W. Wright, and D. A. Givens appeared on behalf of the accused.

Andre keeps a small lunch room at the corner of Gore and Ontario streets, within a stone's throw of the Cereals company's building, where about five hundred of the soldiers are quartered. Acting on complaints that men were being served with liquor in this lunch room, two members of the military police force made a visit to the room, ordered a glass of whiskey from Andre, paid for it, and were served. Then they laid a charge against Andre.

The soldiers who made the raid on the lunch room, swore positively that they had been served with liquor and that Andre had accepted the sum of twenty-five cents for the drinks.

Andre admitted having liquor on the premises, but said that he only had it there for Christmas day, so as to give some of the soldiers who traded with him, a drink by way of Christmas cheer. He swore that he was never paid for any of the liquor.

When the two soldiers who laid the complaint, came into his store, he declared that nothing was said about paying for the liquor.

"One of the men put a quarter into my hand and I did not know what it was for," said Andre.

"But you put the money in your pocket?" queried Mr. Webster.

"Yes, I did," replied Andre. The latter admitted having had four bottles of whiskey on his premises.

Mr. Webster pointed out to the magistrate that a fine of from \$100 to \$500 could be imposed upon the accused. This charge had been laid under the liquor license act, but Andre was still open for criminal prosecution. He asked the court to impose the maximum penalty, stating that the magistrate could not be too severe in such a case as this.

Mr. Givens said that Andre was but treating the men. He was giving a treat to soldiers who were dealing at his lunch counter.

Before imposing the sentence, Magistrate Farrell said that he was convinced that Andre had been violating the law. He believed the story told by the military officers. They had received complaints and had made this discovery as a result of their investigation. It afforded a great temptation for men who were training for service at the front.

**First Aid Lectures.**

It was decided that the necessary funds be donated to furnish a room in the Kingston General Hospital.

After the installation an informal programme was carried out. James Benney addressed the members and guests, and Lieut. W. McCully, Q.M. 21st battalion, was given a farewell address by the members.

**No Foundation For Statement.**  
On October 27th a despatch was published from Ottawa stating that any one to be able to enjoy the privilege of freely passing back and forth across the border must have had at least ten years' residence in the United States, and not merely American citizenship would allow this privilege. American Consul F. S. S. Johnson has received a communication from Washington to the effect that there is absolutely no foundation for the statement.


