SECOND R.S.A. COURSE

OPENED AT TETE DE PONT BARRACKS ON MONDAY.
Report of Military Y. M. C. A. Work
—Rev. E. Leroy Rice Conducted Sunday Evening Service.

The second R. S. A. course opened at Tete de Pont barracks on Monday morning with a class in squad drill after the officers and N. C. O.'s taking the course. They have been medically examined and registered. There are still a number of the officers to come to the city, about twenty being here. Eleven officers and thirty N. C. O.'s are coming from Ottawa on Monday night. The reason so many are coming from one place is that it was thought better to have them come here than establish another school in Ottawa.

Capt. C. P. Fee of the 22nd battery returned on Monday after spending the week-end in Peterboro.

In the militia Y.M.C.A. on Sunday evening, Rev. E. Leroy Rice conducted the service speaking on the moral inspiration given by paintings and music. Mentioning the famous painting, "Check of Ages," he dealt on the subject that there was only one refuge.

On Monday and Thursday evenings the committee, from Queen's University will provide the programme for the soldiers.

P. W. Lilley, secretary gives a very encouraging report for the month of December. The total attendance in the room was 5,370 men, the average daily attendance, 175. There were 2,071 letters and cards mailed at the room, with a daily average of 66. It is estimated that 2,371 letters were written. The value of stamps sold was \$41. During the month, sixty-three moving picture reels were shown. There were six special concerts and musical nights and minutes religious and moral addresses, fifteen special speakers and six special singers at these concerts. There were ten special song services and ten entertainments put on by the soldiers themselves.

The second typhoid inoculation began today at the room, continuing throughout the week, after which the men of the 21st will settle down to constant rifle practice.

Lists of those men who have been rejected and discharged from a battalion are being sent to the commanding officers of all the overseas battalions throughout Canada, so that none of the "castoffs" will be permitted to join any other battalion.

Lieut. H. E. Pense, who has been granted the rank of captain, will be second in command of "F" company 21st battalion, C.E.F.

All the officers in the city have been invited as guests of the Frontenac Hockey Club and Queen's Athletic committee to the game between the Aberdeens and the Frontenacs on Wednesday evening on the covered rink.

GUARDS VISIT BROCKVILLE

Landsdowne's Soldiers Were Entertained by 4th Regiment.

Brockville, Jan. 4.—A novel feature of the celebration of New Year's day in Brockville was the presence of a large body of the Home Guards of Landsdowne, a thriving village west of here. They came by train under command of Capt. Bowen and accompanied by the Landsdowne band. A delegation from the local Home Guard met the visitors at the depot and escorted them to the armories, where they were entertained by the officers of the 41st regiment and drilled jointly with the Brockville Guard. The march through the streets was witnessed by hundreds of citizens who justly cheered the Landsdowne citizen soldiers.

BOMBED GERMAN STATION.

Amsterdam, Jan. 4.—French aviators have succeeded in bombing Berlin, a German aviation station just outside of Brussels. They destroyed a dirigible shed in the course of construction there, and killed several German soldiers.

Noted Methodist Leader.

London, Jan. 4.—The death has been announced of Sir James Mackworth, former member of parliament, and president of the United Methodist Free churches. Sir James was born in 1840, and was prominent in Methodist church work in England. He began to earn his living in a cotton mill before he was seven years old. In the latter years of his life he built up a vast provision business.

London, Jan. 4.—The London Stock Exchange reopened to-day after having been closed five months because of the war situation. The opening was marked with an enormous attendance. Before the formal opening proclamation was made the members gathered in front of their desks, cheered and then united in singing "God Save the King."
