WAR BULLETINS.

Telegrams to Paris report a terrific bloodshed but more advances for the French in Alsace. French cavalry patrols have penetrated to within a few miles of Metz and are nearing Strassburg.

Fred Rogers a popular United States actress, has been driven off the London stage because of her pro-German sympathies.

British squadrons off the Belgian coast on Tuesday were attacked by German submarines which were driven off with two, at least, supposed to be sunk.

The British war office bulletin Tuesday night, said the position of the allies at all points was quite satisfactory.

Reports from the Caucasus indicate that the Turkish army, marching against the Russians there, has been entirely smashed and the czar's men have advanced well into Turkish territory.

The fleets of Britain and France are forcing the Dardanelles, and early occupation of Constantinople is quite possible.

The French have made further attacks in St. Mihiel region, and general advance is in progress.

The Canadian hospital in France is treating many severely wounded.
