SUNDAY GETS IN \$10,000

Evangelist Preaches To Big Receipts in Philadelphia.

Philadelphia, Jan. 9.—Billy Sunday, the evangelist, preached to 40,000 men and women at the two services in the Tabernacle here. One hundred and forty thousand persons have heard him, and more than \$10,000 has been collected in the first four days of his campaign.

During his address one afternoon the evangelist shook his fist at a group of clergymen seated before him and shouted:

"You didn't stick to Torrey and Alexander when they were here, or God would have shaken this old town like a dog shakes a rat. I have a right to demand that the ministers stick by me; stick to the work and the word of God or get out of the ministry."
