London, Jan. 9.—General Joffre has obviously secured the power of offensive which belonged alone to Germany until the middle of November. This is due to his large reinforcements and the withdrawal of 600,000 Germans from the western front.
Col. Roustam Bek, writing in the Daily Express, says:
"The German general staffs' full use of the marvellous network of railways and roads has been paralyzed by the extent of the gigantic front from the North Sea to the Vosges."
"They have to keep a watch along the whole line to avert the blow of allied forces on the western front are. We are on the eve of decisive events of great importance."
Recent French and German official reports speak of mines and countermining as a feature of trench warfare. A British officer just returned to London from the front says that it is likely to cause heavy losses as the Germans are pushing further back. Their practice is to mine the trench before leaving.
