Questioned in connection with the report, Sir George Foster, minister of trade and commerce, stated that As he approached half a dozen ritles it would not be difficult to trace such consignments from Canada to New York and to the Scandinavian dester would be difficult. Flour exported from Canada to the United States for despatch to Europe would have to go in bond, owing to the heavy duty. It would, therefore, be matter for the customs/officials to ascertain the volume of such trade. Such consignments, of course, would not be booked for Germany direct, but if the volume of the export to whatever neutral port might be chosen were abnormal, there would be just cause for suspicion as to the ultimate destination of the consign-

There is a strong feeling here that in view of the rise in the price of flour, both in Great Britain and the United States, every effort should be made to prevent the export of the Canadian product to the enemy's country. If it is found that the trade is being engineered by Canadian residents there will be serious trouble for

A number of millers in various parts of the country are reported as declaring that so far as they know Canadian flour is not being shipped to enemy countries. If it is so shipped it is by United States purchasers and is not within Canadian control.

On November 21st. 14,150 tons food stuffs had crossed the Beigium frontier for distribution in Beigium These goods were mainly: 8,200 tons of wheat; 740 tons of flour; 1006 tons of rice; 360 tons of beans and peas; the balance miscellaneous.
