THE BOARD OF TRADE PETITIONS THE C.N.R.

To Change Time of Its Train Leaving Kingston.

MERCHANTS PROTEST AS EARLY LEAVING AFFECTS THEIR BUSINESS.

Resolution Passes With Regard to Hydro Power — Young Men of Frontenac Not Taking Advantage of Agricultural Course. At the meeting of the Board of Trade on Thursday evening, a letter from the wholesale merchants of the city asked that the board petition the Canadian Northern Railway company to change back the time of train No. 625, leaving Kingston, from 2:15 p.m. to 4:30 p.m., as the merchants are not now able to make shipments of freight on the same day as the customers' orders are received, these orders reaching the city about noon. They feel that it is a discrimination against the Kingston merchants, especially in their trade with places west, as it takes an extra day to deliver the goods. The following resolution, moved by J. M. Campbell, and seconded by R. J. Carson, was passed: "That a copy of the petition from the wholesale and retail merchants be forwarded to the C.N.R. authorities and that their attention be drawn to the fact that the change of time makes it impossible to ship local freight promptly, and interferes with the passenger business to the city; and that action is liable to antagonize the merchants of the city in reference to shipments of through freight." W. Y. Mills said that a similar petition would be signed by the retail merchants and he, with I. F. Harrison, had the petition circulated today.

Eastern Ontario Badly Used

R. J. McLelland stated that at the present time the municipalities in the eastern part of Ontario are being very badly used by the Hydro-Electric Commission, as compared to what has been done for the municipalities of the western part of the province. On the Hydro-Electric Commission are only three members. They come from Hamilton and Toronto. Mr. McLelland's idea, which was endorsed by the members present, was that, if necessary, more members should be on the commission, so that the eastern part of the province would be better represented. About February 25th the meeting of Ontario Associated Boards of Trade will be held in Hamilton. A committee composed of Messrs. R. Meek, J. M. Campbell, R. J. McLelland and Elmer Davis will represent the local board at the meeting and work in the interests of having a resolution, that was passed regarding the power question, endorsed by the Associated Boards of Trade, so that action will be taken to have this change brought about. As all resolutions that are to be presented at the meeting in Hamilton must be in the hands of the secretary by to-day, the matter had to be acted on immediately, and after the meeting a committee drafted the resolution.

Other Business.

A communication was read from the Dominion Railway Commission that it would not order the G.T.R. to put the six o'clock train service between here and Toronto on again for the present. A communication was read from J. Nash asking that action be taken to have the telephone rates between here and Syracuse, N.Y., adjusted. The matter had been referred to the local manager, who was communicating with the American Bell company to have the matter attended to. It was decided to ask the city for a copy of the agreement between the Bell Telephone company and the city and the time when the agreement expired.

The entertainment committee will be asked to report on the annual banquet, which last year was held in February. The matter of asking that C. C. Main, of Sydney, change his headquarters to the city was left in abeyance. The County Council some time ago refused to endorse the change in residence of the agricultural representative. It was felt that this was a mistake on its part because a change in his residence to the city would allow him to be in closer contact with a greater number of farmers. While on the farming subject, the president, R. Meek, spoke of the fine arrangements that had been made by the government in the agricultural course now being held in the old collegiate building. Only a few farmers are taking the course, although it had been widely advertised. Special speakers come down from Guelph and Toronto, and yet the young men of the county will not spend their board bill to hear how it is possible, with intelligent farming systems, to double their present crops with less work. A resolution was passed, that had been moved by R. J. Carson and seconded by R. J. McLelland, that the city inquire into the cause of the delay in getting cheap power in the city as this was a very important question with new industries.

AN IMAGINARY RAID. Germans Put Scare Headlines On Tame Story. London, Jan. 15.—E. F. Stewart, telegrapher to the Daily News from Rotterdam: "Most of the latest German newspapers to arrive here contain screaming headlines about a Zeppelin attack against London. Flung across the front page of the Berliner Allgemeine Zeitung are announcements in big type of a German air attack against London, and the flight of a Zeppelin and a squadron of aeroplanes over the Thames. Underneath this is printed a message from Copenhagen, which does not bear out what the headlines assert. Indeed, it is a clear admission that the raid, if it was attempted, was a gigantic failure."

LIVE SHELL SOUVENIR. Police Confiscated Parisian Lady's Dangerous Relic. Paris, Jan. 15.—Since the German retreat from the Marne, Parisians of every class have acquired souvenirs ranging from caissons to cartridge cases abandoned by the Germans. Few push the collection mania to the extent of a suburban resident, Madame B., who caused a local panic yesterday by the attempted introduction into her apartment house of a live German shell found on her farm near Soissons. The janitor declined to admit the dangerous souvenir, which the woman wished to keep for her husband, who is at the front. Finally the dispute was referred to the nearest police station, which confiscated the shell for removal to the municipal laboratories.

GERMANY AFTER NEW LOAN. Appeal To Be Made In February Or March. London, Jan. 15.—The Times says it appears from the German press that precautions are being made for a second war loan issue. It will be remembered that the Reichstag in December voted fresh credits to the amount of \$1,250,000,000. According to the Berliner Tageblatt, a new appeal will be made in February or, at the latest, in March. The Vossische Zeitung says it will be made in March.

BATTLE FILMS FOR TURKS Kaiser's Present Shows German Troops In Action. Paris, Jan. 15.—Emperor William has presented the Turkish government with a series of moving picture films of the Germans in battle, according to a Copenhagen despatch to the Times. These it is affirmed, will be reproduced before the public at Constantinople.

Regina Police Chief Resigns. Regina, Sask., Jan. 15.—Before the New Police Commission could take definite action on the report of Judge Farrell on the recent police investigation, Chief of Police Berry today handed in his resignation, which was at once accepted. Judge Farrell, in his report, severely criticized Chief Berry in several particular.
