HELPED A BEGGAR. She is Now Happy; Her Face Just Shines. At the monthly meeting of the St. Andrew's Church Auxiliary to the Women's Missionary Society the following interesting extract from a letter of Miss H. P. Lavelle, a graduate of Queen's University, and wife of a Presbyterian missionary in North Honan, China, was read. It gives a glimpse of the relation of the medical mission—the caring for the suffering bodies—to the evangelizing ones in ministering to the darkened souls.

"You will be glad to hear more of that poor woman of whom I wrote to you last spring, who said she was going to 'study the doctrine' and become a Christian, that she might be cured of a dangerous tumour. She has been cured but not in the way that she expected. In the spring she walked over from hospital. An operation was necessary, but having been a beggar, she was not allowed to stand in front of the hospital and beg for it. For one month she and her little daughter lived in the hospital and spent all their time studying and listening to the scriptures. They removed the tumour, which was twenty-five pounds and she spent other six weeks, during which she continued her Bible study. After she left we did not see her again for some time, but we heard of her. She is in the service of an official family. She came to the autumn rally here and Miss Hodge kept her and her serving woman, teaching her every day and hopes she may be able to help her in evangelistic work. I never saw anyone more changed in appearance; her face just shines."
