MOHAMMEDAN PERIL LATEST GERMAN CRY Warn Russians in Manifesto That "God Has Abandoned" Their Standard.

Paris, Jan. 20.—A Petrograd despatch to the Temps says the Germans are distributing over the Russian lines by means of aeroplanes the following manifesto:

"God has abandoned your standard. The bloody sacrifices you have made are useless. Hundreds of thousands of your best and most valiant troops have fallen on the battlefield, and now a new enemy, more powerful and more dangerous, has declared war on your czar. Islam has declared a holy war on you and your allies. You have lost the game. Four hundred million men devoted to the law of Mohammedan to-day are replying to the call for a holy war in three corners of the world. In Asia, in Africa and in Europe Mohammedans are gathering to fight the Russians, the English and the French. Already the czar's Mohammedan subjects have risen in revolt. Friends, demand peace while yet there is time!"

MAY BECOME REAL JEWS.

Home Government and Repatriation in Palestine.

London, Jan. 20.—Stephen Graham, in the London Sunday Times, gives an account of a visit he recently paid to M. Sazonoff, at the foreign minister's house in Petrograd. In the course of the conversation on subjects dealing with the war, Mr. Graham questioned M. Sazonoff about the autonomy of Poland and the position of the Jews there. He suggested that something should be done to help out the Jews who wished to go to America. M. Sazonoff replied:

"They are not likely to go in great numbers. They don't want to go. They would much rather settle in Russia or Siberia."

Mr. Graham asked if anything was likely to be done to relieve the tension of the Jewish problem. M. Sazonoff thought it possible, says Mr. Graham, that they might be excused from military service in the future if they wished it. He recognized the great difficulty of dealing with the Jewish problem, but spoke enthusiastically of the coming restoration of Poland. Russia, he said, ought to have made up her quarrel with the suffering Poles long ago.

Mr. Graham, lecturing last night at the National Liberal club, made a further reference to the position of the Jews in Russia. He said the light there was not much likelihood of their being allowed to overrun the Russian empire, the prejudice against them being too great at court and among the peasantry. Palestine having fallen, he said, it should be found possible to establish a Jewish government there. Jews all the world over having the option of becoming real Jews under the protection of their own government.
