

Who is With the 101st Grenadiers, Fighting in German East Africa -Regiment Lost Heavily.

Bishop Bidwell writes to Whig as follows: The following extracts from a letland from my brother, Major R. P. Bidwell, of the 101st Grenadiers, and forwarded by her to me, may be of some interet to your readers. The letter is dated November 16th, but the name of the place from which it was written has been torn off the top of the letter. I suppose by the

"We left Bombay, on October 16th, and after a calm voyage we landed at a place called Tanga in German East Africa on November 3rd and 4th. The main battle took place on November 4th. The Germans were in very much stronger force than had been anticipated, so we had to get back into our ships and come here. We have settled lown into camp. Our regiment lost very heavily.
