SHIP 3,000 FEET IN AIR.

Wonderful Sight Is Sberingham Resident's Comment.

London, Jan. 21.—"I believe there were two airships," said a resident of Sberingham to the correspondent of the Daily Mail in that town.

"The Zeppelin, like a great cigar, lay dim and dark against the blackness of the sky, but its outlines were unmistakable. It was fitted with searchlights which now and then were flashed below, casting weird rays of light on the dark town and countryside.

"Then came the crash of bombs. There was a tremendous sensation in the town, but no panic, as the people hurried into the streets. The damage done was not great.

"In one street, I inspected a hole made by a bomb. It was two feet deep and about eighteen inches wide. I saw this hole forty-five minutes after the bomb fell, and it was still so hot that you could not bear to place your hand in it. The Zeppelin I saw disappeared in the direction of Cromer."

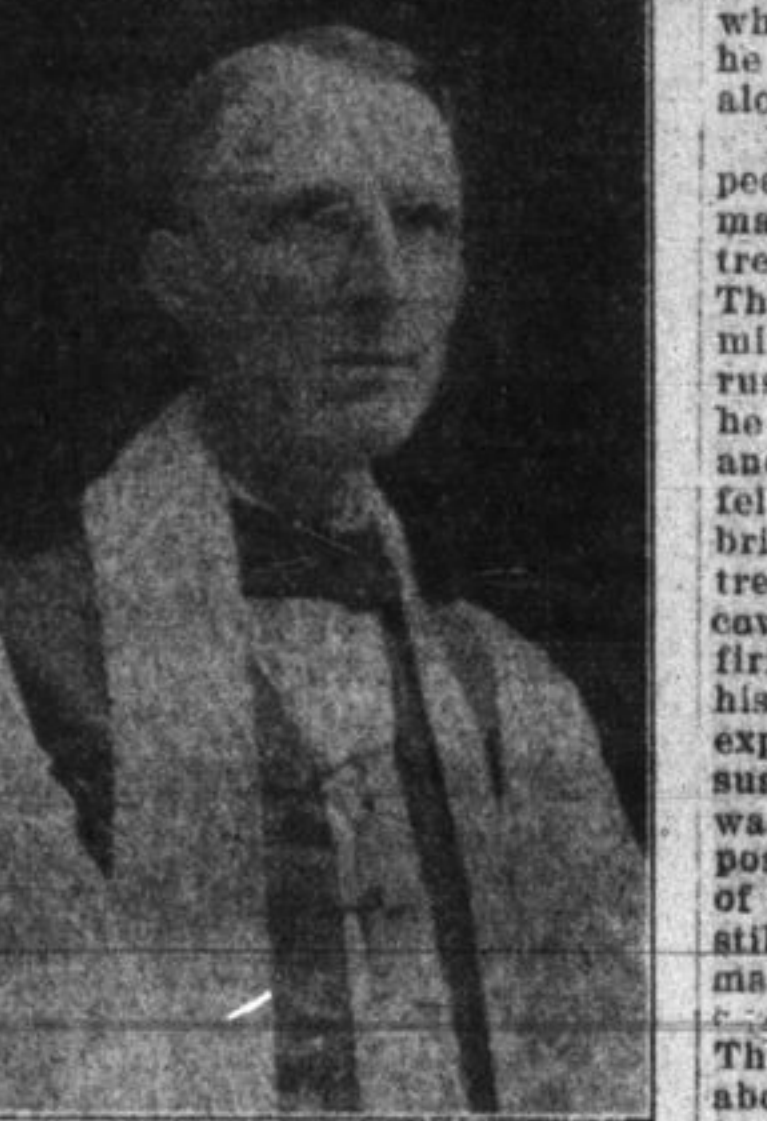

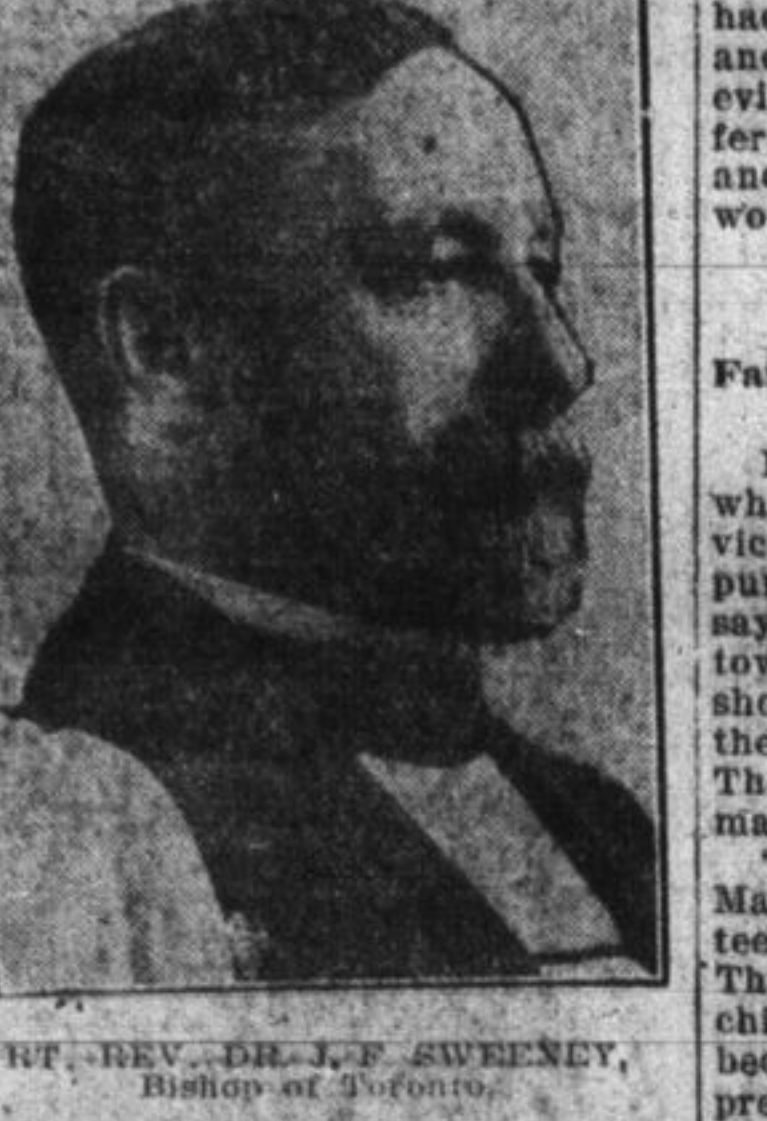

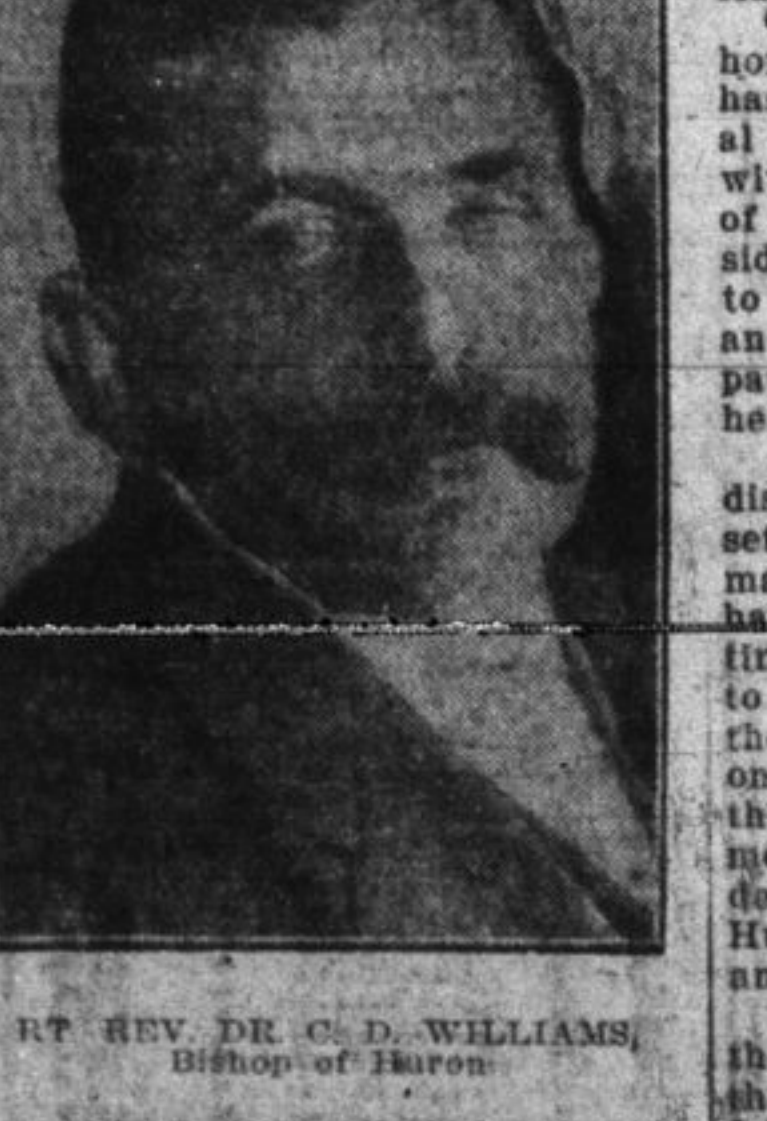

YOUTH TOOK A TRENCH

GERMANS THOUGHT HE WAS A LARGE FORCE.

His Heroism and Coolness Won An Advance For a French Regiment Near Ypres

At last all his ammunition gone, Thorel retired and told his officer about the unoccupied trench in which he had made his lonely fight.
