


GERMANS THOUGHT HE WAS A IN KINGSTON

oes of the war. It was near Ypres that his regiment was ordered to re-take the ground that the French had lost a little while before. The first attack falled, and the second was being attempted when it was decided in view of the difficulties of the ground, to postpone it until night. Thorel was in the front rank and, carried along by his enthusiasm, he did not hear the order to retire and continued to dash forward, believing he was followed by his comrades. At last he reached a deserted trench and sprang into it. Then when there was time to look around

he found to his surprise he was

Retreat was impossible, for as he peeped ahead he saw crowds of Germans coming and going in another trench only twenty-five metres away. The time had come to act, and his mind was soon 'made up. Making a rush for his rifle under the shelter, he brought the sights on a German and pulled the trigger. The German fell, then a second, and a third. A brisk volley came from the German trench, but Thorel was under good cover and was not hit. He continued firing rapidly, and more than 150 of his two hundred cartridges had been expended when the Jermans, persuaded by his activity that the trench was strongly held, bolted to another position further to their rear. Some of them in their flight fell to the still unconquered young infantry-

Thorel retired and told his officer about the unoccupied trench in which he had made his lonely fight, and about the other trench that the Ger-mans had deserted under his fire-The French at once advanced, and in the trench from which the Germans had been driven they found arms and ammunition, as well as many evidences that the Germans had suffered severely. The heroism and coolness of one young fellow had won this position for his regiment.

ZEPPELIN DISAPPOINTS

Fails To Realize Anticipations Inventor's Employers.

London, Jan. 21- The Daily Mail, while expressing sympathy with the victims, protests that no military purpose was served by the raid.
