NEED GERMAN BOATS
CANADIAN INTERESTS ASK FOR THEIR RELEASE.
Ocean Rates Too High—Canadian Companies Have Suffered Through Loss of Ship Space.
Ottawa, Jan. 21.—The government has been advised that a request has been made by British and Canadian shipping interests to the imperial authorities for the release of a number of captured German ships so as to relieve the freight congestion caused by the commandeering of so many British freighters by the admiralty.
Freight is now abnormally high in spite of the fact that the sea lanes have been rendered tolerably safe from German raiders. This is because, as stated, so many of the regular vessels have been removed from commerce for war purposes. The Canadian companies have suffered just as heavily as the British ones. It is learned that some Canadian vessels are even being used as prison ships.
Under the circumstances it is considered advisable to utilize the number of German and Austrian ships seized, known to number over 400, to fill the gaps caused by the taking over of British vessels. One German boat is at present on the coast of London, but whether this course will be generally followed and the request of the shipping men acceded to is not known.

NOT ALL NURSES EQUIPPED.
Profession Stands in Urgent Need of Proper Standardization.
The Youth's Companion.
The activity of the Red Cross since the war began has brought nursing to public attention. Everyone knows that Red Cross nurses are trained nurses, and most persons supposed that all trained nurses could qualify for Red Cross service. That, however, is far from being the case.
There are few professions so loosely organized as nursing. Everything is expected from a trained nurse—that she have education, skill, tact, executive ability; that she fit into any household and rise to any emergency; and yet there are few things less understood, few enterprises less frequently endowed, than those that deal with the training that makes a competent nurse.
There are nurses—thousands of them—who have been graduated from training schools of high standard, who are registered by the state and who are worth every penny of the \$25 or \$35 a week that they receive. But there are also hundreds of others who have had only a brief course in some poorly equipped and poorly managed hospital who may never have been graduated and who are not registered, but who, owing to the ignorance of the public and the carelessness of doctors, are able to slip into a rank to which they are not entitled and to receive wages that they have no right to ask.
In other words, the profession of nursing is not yet standardized.
Some of the unregistered nurses are quite capable of handling simple cases, and if they were known merely by attendants and received only the lowest wages to which they are entitled, there would be less confusion; but as long as the public does not bother to find out whether it is getting what it pays for, the confusion will continue.
But the public grows in knowledge. People are beginning to realize that there are hospitals that establish training schools, not for the purpose of giving a sound education in nursing, but merely as a means of

ZEPPELIN UNWIELDY.
American Inventor of Explosives Says Germans Hopew vain.
New York, Jan. 21.—The high hopes held in Germany concerning the effectiveness of the Zeppelins as a new factor in warfare are doomed to disappointment in the opinion of Hiram Maxims.
The famous inventor of explosives not only declared that dirigibles are unwieldy and difficult to manipulate or steer, which detracts from their usefulness in warfare, but that bombs dropped from them miss the target and also lose force.

IRISHMEN PROTEST
Against Lord Aberdeen Taking the Name Of "Tara."
London, Jan. 21.—Lord Aberdeen's intended compliment to Ireland by adding "Tara" to his title, has been taken amiss by many Irishmen, several of whom address protests to the newspapers.
An Ulster man declares in the Morning Post that the name of Tara, if ever used again as a title, can only be fittingly worn by the sovereign of Ireland sitting on the imperial throne of the British empire.
