Part Of Shaft Penetrated Its Neck—One Driver Had a Narrow Escape From Injury.

In a runaway accident which occurred on Friday morning, on Ontario street, near Clarence, the life of James Thibeau, Quebec street, was greatly endangered, and the horse which he was driving received injuries that may possibly cause its death.

About 11:30 o'clock a team of horses owned by S. W. Greer, Bath Road, were standing in front of the Kingston Milling company's premises, corner of Brock and Ontario streets. The animals became frightened and dashed along the roadway on the left side of the street. When opposite Fenwick & Hendry's warehouse the delivery wagon of Z. VanLaven was coming along, driven by Mr. Thibeau, and the two collided with terrible impact. The tongue of the sleigh to which the runaway horses were attached, ran into Mr. VanLaven's horse's neck, for a distance of nearly six inches, until it came to the widened portion, which prevented the tongue from penetrating further. The tongue was broken off two feet from the end, and the portion broken off was left sticking in the wounded animal's neck.

Mr. Thibeau, who received a bad shaking up, had presence of mind to recover himself sufficiently from the shock and pull the broken splinter from the horse's flesh. As soon as he did so the blood began to pour out in a stream and Mr. Greer hurried the horse off to the veterinary surgeon to have its injuries attended to. It was placed in L. Guest's livery stable. Mr. Thibeau had to remain in the office of Fenwick & Hendry for a short while, until he fully recovered from the shock.

A Graceful Figure.

Quite often the figure of a pretty girl is spoiled by stooping shoulders, a contracted chest or a careless, slouching gait.
