It Reached Brother of Ranchman in Far Away India.

A story regarding the wheat crop of George Hewes, in Gray county, Kan., published last week, led to the reuniting of Mr. Hewes and his nephews in far-off India.

The nephew, George C. Hewes, had lost track of his uncle, letters he had written to the former addresses having been returned, and he had no idea where he was located.

One day a copy of a newspaper containing the account of the big wheat crop of the George Hewes ranch near Cimarron fell into the hands of the nephew, a missionary in India. He recognized the name, and at once wrote to his long-lost uncle. The latter has just received the letter. He told not know his nephew was in India. The latter is a Methodist missionary at Pithoragarh, Kumaun, India.
