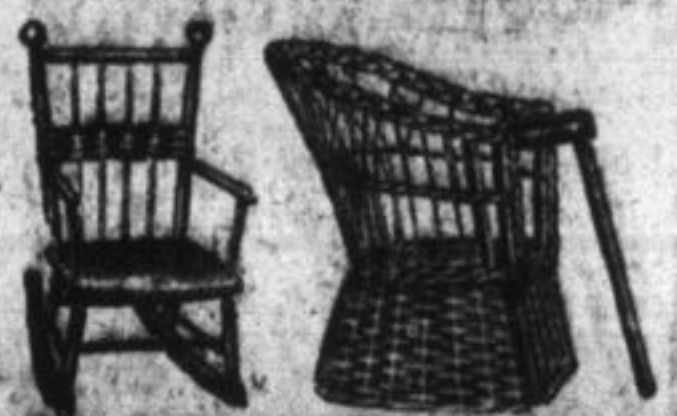
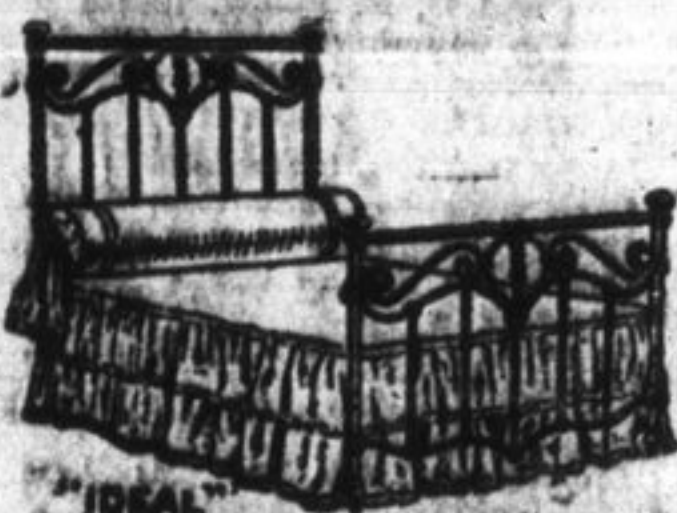
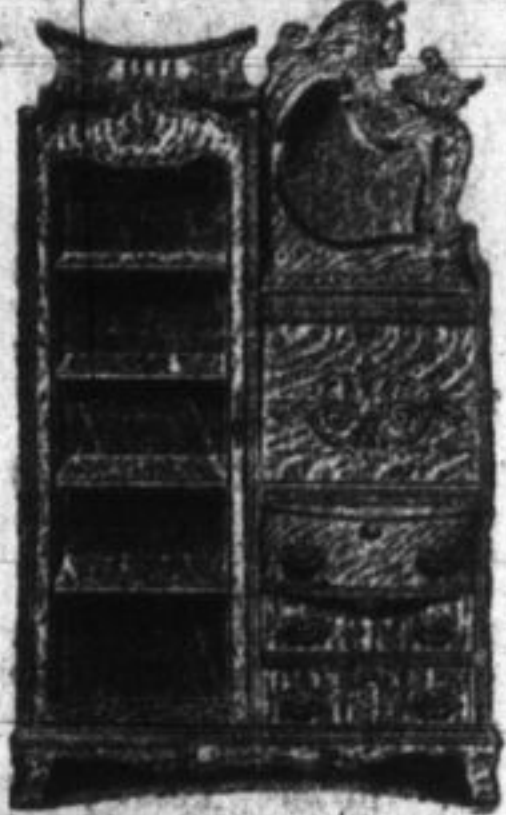

**COL. DENISON SPOKE**

**AT SOLDIERS' ENTERTAINMENT WEDNESDAY NIGHT.**  
 Qualifications Granted to Officers—  
 Col. Hemming in Belleville Regarding Mobilization of 39th Battalion.  
 Col. S. J. A. Denison, brigade commander, was well pleased with the 21st Battalion. He considers that it is in excellent condition and the men are thoroughly disciplined and realize the value of this asset in a soldier.  
 On Harrisfield common Lieut. Col. W. S. Hughes put the battalion through several manoeuvres, and then the men were drawn up and the brigade commander gave them a short address. He said that he was pleased to be able to say that the 21st was one of the units of his brigade. His work that had been shown him was satisfactory in every way. He was sure that in the near future arrangements would be made to take the men to the front, and he was sure that when his brigade reached there, it would be a credit to Canada.

He gave him to be present and see the good work that they were doing. He left at noon on Thursday for Ottawa.

Bennett in the inspector's office for two months, Mr. Bennett having been granted leave of absence, owing to ill-health.

**STEALING OF BRASS**

**LOCAL POLICE UNEARTHED ABOUT 500 POUNDS.**

Property Of the G. T. R., and It is Said To Have Been Shipped to Kingston by Ottawa Parties—Was Located in a Junk Shop Here.

Detective Tisdale of the Grand Trunk railway, is in the city making an investigation regarding the theft of brass belonging to the company. As the result of a visit Constable James Bateson made to a local junk shop, he unearthed close to five hundred pounds of brass, which bears the stamp of the railway company. The brass was at once confiscated, and the railway company notified and Detective Tisdale came to the city to check over the booty, and to work on the case.

It is stated that the brass was shipped here by parties in Ottawa, and interesting developments may be looked for. It will be remembered that about a year ago, the local police discovered several tons of brass belonging to the G.T.R. in a local junk shop. It was found that the brass had been shipped to Kingston from Ottawa, and as the result of the investigation which followed, the Ottawa police arrested men who were found guilty of having shipped the brass to this city.

Some of the pieces of brass found in the recent raid had not been used. Railway companies are always losing brass, and detectives in their endless quest for ever hunting down thieves who make off with it.

**THE LATE MRS. GOING.**

**Aged Clergy Street Lady Died on Wednesday Night.**

Augusta Jane White, widow of the late Shirley Going, passed away at her late residence, 51 Clergy street, on Wednesday night, at 10.45, after a few hours' illness.

The late Mrs. Going was born at Quinville House, county Clare, Ireland, seventy years ago, and in 1845 she came to Canada and took up residence at Richmond, Que. Here she lived until 1867, when she married the late Mr. Going, who predeceased her some years ago. Since her marriage the late Mrs. Going lived in Kingston and vicinity, where she made many staunch friends. In religion she was an Anglican, and a member of St. George's Cathedral, among which congregation she was widely known.

To mourn her loss there are one daughter and two sons: H. W. Going, Brockville; John Shirley Going, Paisley, Cal.; Miss Mary Going, residing at home. One sister and one brother also survive, Finch White and Georgina White, both of Melbourne, Que.

The funeral will be conducted privately from her late residence to St. George's Cathedral on Friday afternoon at 2.15 o'clock. The dean of Ontario and Canon Groat will officiate, after which the remains will be placed in Catawagui vault.
