Once he uttered a few words, but from that time until seven o'clock Thursday morning he gradually sank.

Charles L. Panet, secretary of the militia department, authorized to announce an honorary lieutenant-colonel. Rev. William A. Sunday has been invited to New York for an evangelistic campaign such as he is now conducting in Philadelphia.

Provisional President Roque Gonzalez Garza, Mexico, arranged to authorize a loan of fifteen million pesos to pay the expenses of war and of the pacification of the country.

N. F. Hazel, K.C., Winnipeg, died Wednesday, after a long illness, aged sixty-eight. Born in Oxford county, he was called to the Ontario bar in 1873. He practiced in British Columbia and the Yukon.

The latest casualty in the Canadian Expeditionary Force is the death on January 26th of Pte. Charles R. MacKenzie, 15th Battalion, at No. 1 Canadian General Field Hospital, Netherlands, from broncho-pneumonia.

The fleet of German liners tied up at their docks in Hoboken, N.J., blossomed out, on Wednesday, with German and American flags and with red, white and black bunting in observance of Emperor William's birthday.

One of Barrie's oldest and best-known residents died Tuesday, in the senior judge of the county of Simcoe. He was eighty years of age and retired from the bench three years ago, after thirty years of service.

Two companies of the Toronto University Officers' Training Corps will hold a march to Hamilton and return in the very near future, according to arrangements which have been made. The tramp is expected to occupy three days.

WAR BULLETINS.

The Australian-Indian force has checked the Turks' advance on the Suez Canal, and is forcing its retreat.

German forces attacking the British Congo have been repulsed with heavy loss. Lieut. Col. Von Heydedreck died of wounds after being captured by the British.

The French regained, with heavy loss all ground lost early on Tuesday in the Croume district.

Officers of the North Sea fleet at Newcastle, Eng., say it was British submarines which torpedoed the German cruiser Gazelle in the Baltic Sea.

From Admiral Beatty's report it is believed the German cruiser Kolberg was sunk in the North Sea battle.

Private James McNish and Private Norman McLeod were killed in action; Private William Thorburn died of wounds. These are the casualties in the Princess Pats announced at Ottawa.

A fierce battle was fought near Soissons; Germans leaving a thousand dead in a small area.

A London proposal is to defer the general elections till peace comes.

A Roumanian war loan of twenty-five million dollars has been financed in London.

VERY HEAVY LOSSES.

Paris, Jan. 28. (3 p. m. official)—The German losses in the last three days of the fighting in Flanders and France total at least 20,000, so the French war office claimed today.

AT THE POLICE COURT.

There was a very brief session of the police court on Thursday morning. Two tipplers were the only offenders, and a fine of \$2 and costs was imposed on each. One said it was a year since he had been before the court and asked for leniency. The other said he had taken some whiskey as he was not feeling very well.

Weather Notes.

The Atlantic coast disturbance is likely to develop into an important storm. The intensely cold weather which has prevailed in the western provinces for several days is now spreading over Ontario. Storm signals are displayed in the maritime provinces.

Cut Civic Salaries.

Brandon, Man., Jan. 28.—A reduction of \$7,000 per annum in Brandon's civic salary list was put into effect at a special meeting of the council. Reductions in salaries practically affected every city employee, a general cut of about five per cent. being authorized.

Zeppelin Raids to be Prevented

Paris, Jan. 28.—Increased activity of the Kaiser's airman, coupled with rumors of a Zeppelin raid on Paris, has caused the war office to announce new aerial defence plans. Aviators will be stationed by pairs upon the outskirts of the city, ready to take the air to engage the invading sky warriors. They will be supported by armed French dirigibles that will hover constantly over the city.

War Tidings.

Small-pox is so prevalent in Austria that in Vienna various barracks are being converted into isolation hospitals. At Liège, Belgium, the wife of Greek Consul Calwaert, charged with aiding Belgians to escape, has been sentenced to three years' imprisonment. Great Britain may introduce compulsory service and increase its total fighting strength by the end of the current year to 4,000,000 men.

Hon. P. Blondin, minister of inland revenue, Ottawa, has been notified that Yves Bibus, an official in the department, who was a French reservist, has been captured by the Germans and is a prisoner of war at Zossen, near Berlin. It is believed in militia circles that the Canadian troops at Salisbury Plain will move to France within a few days.
