THE LATEST MARKET REPORTS Toronto, Jan. 25.—The run of cattle at the Union Stock Yards this morning was light and trade was a little firmer, with prices about even with last week's closing. There were a few good butchers, which sold readily. The demand for milkers and springers was good. The quality of lambs offered was poor, but the market was steady. Sheep and hogs were firm and calves 25c higher. Receipts were 1825 cattle, 14 calves, 2375 hogs and 715 sheep. To-day's prices were: Butcher cattle, choice, \$7.50 to \$8; do. medium, \$5.25 to \$6; do. common, \$4.75 to \$5.50; butcher cows, canners, \$3 to \$4.25; do. bulls, \$6.50 to \$6.75; feeding steers, \$6.25 to \$6.75; stockers, choice, \$5.75 to \$6.25; do. light, \$5.50 to \$5.75; milkers, choice, \$6.50 to \$9; do. springers, \$5.50 to \$6.50; sheep, ewes, \$5 to \$6; bucks and culls, \$3.50 to \$4.50; lambs, \$7.25 to \$8.80; hogs, fed and watered, \$7.50; hogs, f.o.b., \$7.15; calves, \$7.50 to \$10.50.
