THE COUNTY COUNCIL

RAISES THE SALARY OF HIGH COUNTY CONSTABLE.

Dr. I. G. Bogart Reports About the Jail—The Men's Cells Should Be Enlarged—Appropriations Made. The Frontenac Council held its Friday afternoon session with the aid of gas lamps, as the evening shades were falling when the councillors gathered round their horse-shoe in the Red Chamber of the court house. The members were busy all day doing committee work. It might be mentioned that the lights in the council chamber are little better than coal oil lamps. They look as if they were put there fifty years ago or more, when the gas works was first established in Kingston. Councillor Halliday, chairman of the Property Committee, proposes to light the chamber by electricity before next session. The Friday afternoon session opened with a report from High County Constable John Purdy, who told of increased duties, and asked for a fifty-dollar increase, making his salary \$200. The high constable stated that last year he paid out \$100 in expenses out of his own pocket to earn his \$150. He claimed that he saved the county much money by getting rid of tramps, not by arrest, but by making them step along lively to the next municipality. The report of Constable Purdy stated that he had attended several fairs in the county last year and found that the last year's gambling was strictly enforced. He spent about fifty-one days attending at places where he considered his services might be required. On motion of Councillors Foley and Wensley, the high constable's salary was fixed at \$200. Dr. I. G. Bogart reported 231 entries to the jail during 1914. There were no contagious diseases. The physician made 168 trips in the year to see patients—seeing one to five prisoners each time. Dr. Bogart spoke highly of the good work of jailer C. H. Corbett and Sheriff Dawson in the interests of the prisoners. There had been no deaths during the year—in fact, there had been no deaths in the jail during the six years he was jail physician. Four prisoners were removed to hospital for treatment. The jail was a credit to the city and county, for it was always clean and always sanitary. It would be better however, to make two cells into one, so as to give the male prisoners more elbow room. That the prisoners humanely, said the doctor, and send them out better than when they entered. Dr. Bogart said that years ago the jail drug bill ran from \$100 to \$300 a year. During last year, his drug bill was \$28, and he believed the prisoners got all the drugs they needed. William Griffiths, Loughboro, and Elijah Sisworth, of Portland, are appointed trustees of Sydenham high school for three years. On recommendation of the Finance committee the following appropriations were made until June: Council \$1,500; court house, \$1,000; jail \$1,500; charities, \$1,000; private \$200; the \$500 miscellaneous, \$1,200; roads and bridges \$1,000; good roads, \$5,000; road repairs, \$1,000; total \$14,000. The Roads and Bridges Committee recommended that a grant of \$200 be made, to repair the boundary bridge between Miller township in Frontenac and Abinger township, in Lennox and Addington, on condition that a similar grant be made by the latter county council. Adopted. The council, on recommendation of the Good Roads Committee, voted \$150 to Ross La Rose, for injury received, providing Portlatch township gives \$100. The concluding session of the council was held on Saturday morning. A resolution was passed, on motion of Councillors Franklin and Foley, expressing the sympathy of the council with the family of the late D. D. Rogers in their bereavement. A grant of \$50 was made to the cadet corps of the Sydenham High School. On motion of Councillors Spankie and Franklin, the public school inspector was authorized to supply school centres at which entrance examinations are held, with necessary stationery and charge the same to the County Council. The council adjourned until the 16th of June at 4 p.m.

County Jail Still Asylum For Inebriates. "A year ago I made the statement before you that the county jail was an inebriate asylum. It is still too much of an inebriate asylum. There are too many drunken men there." This spoke Dr. I. G. Bogart at the Frontenac county council on Friday evening, when presenting his report for the past year on jail conditions. "The law of our province licenses the sale of liquor, and then you send men to jail for drinking it in excess," Dr. Bogart said. "You should keep drunkards in some other place till they are sober, and then send them out again. There is one man in the county jail now who practically lives there. As soon as he gets out he becomes drunk, and is sent back over and over again."

Flags to be Presented. To the 21st Overseas Battalion Will Cost \$700. The Kingston Veterans' Association has ordered two flags that will be presented to the 21st Battalion as soon as they arrive. One is the colors of the battalion and the other a huge Union Jack. Both flags are of silk and of splendid workmanship, and will be a credit to the citizens who are contributing towards them, and to the battalion. Commandant Ingledew and a prominent merchant are in charge of the funds for the flags which will cost about \$700. The presentation will take place either in the armouries or the cricket field, and will be a ceremony of great interest.
