KAISER HAD HIS WISH

BAVARIANS MET BRITISH BUT SURRENDERED

The Emperor Had Expressed Hope That Bavarians Would Meet the English Just Once More.

Copenhagen, Feb. 4.—A Berlin report states that the Kaiser recently visited Doberitz concentration camp. All the prisoners were mustered while the Kaiser held religious service. The Kaiser also sent Imperial Chancellor von Bethmann-Hollweg to the camp at Rupprecht, Bavaria. The Imperial chancellor had a long conversation with the general and stayed two days. Von Bethmann-Hollweg then visited the headquarters of the staff of the Bavarian army and inspected the artillery positions. He reported that he brought messages from the Kaiser, who hoped that the Bavarians would meet the English just once more. The Kaiser was previously reported to have said to the commander of the Bavarian army corps: "I should like the English to meet the Bavarians just once."

Shortly afterwards he had his wish, for news was received of the British occupation of Leffinghe and Raverayke, and the report of the encounter stated that an entire Bavarian battalion refused to fight and surrendered.

MONEY ORDERS TO FRANCE

All Restrictions Also Removed With Colonies.

Ottawa, Feb. 4.—By direction of the postmaster-general, the money order business between Canada and France is now being resumed, exchange being on a sufficiently stable basis to warrant this.

All special restrictions as regards money orders issued on the United Kingdom, and on all countries and offices for which the British Postal Department acts as intermediary, and on all colonies with which Canada has direct money order exchange, have also, until further notice, been removed.

BETHEL CHURCH LOSSES

ITS PASTOR, REV. A. P. MERSHON, NEEDED SUNDAY.

Annual Meeting of the Congregation Held On Wednesday Evening—Resolution of Appreciation Passed.

The annual meeting of Bethel Congregational church was held on Wednesday night, and the officers for the year were elected.

The devotional exercises were in charge of the pastor, Rev. A. P. Mershon, who took the chair while the general business was transacted.

After the reading of the secretary's minutes by J. Wilson, acting secretary, a satisfactory report was received from A. Kennedy, treasurer, showing all bills of the year paid and a balance on hand. Encouraging reports were also received from the following organizations: Missions and benevolences, Sunday School, primary department, Young Men's Athletic Club, Ladies' Aid Society, Missionary Society, Young Ladies' Mission Circle, C. E. Society, C. E. Missionary Commission, and several Sunday School organized classes by the pastor.

The pastor's report was received a successful year and the audited treasuries of the church amounted to over \$400.

The pastor in giving his annual report expressed his regrets that the church had not seen fit to put forth the usual year-end efforts that had been conducted in other years, and his feeling was that there should have been a united effort of evangelism throughout the city, especially when so many strangers were within our gates.

The pastor's statistical report, covering the four years of his ministry, showed a strong programme and good growth in the membership. When Mr. Mershon came to the church there were eighty-nine members on the roll, and during his ministry that number has nearly doubled.

In receiving the pastor's report, a resolution voicing the hearty appreciation of the congregation for the splendid pastoral services rendered by Mr. Mershon, was passed, and a commendation was passed, and a resolution of very feelingly by Mr. Mershon. Mrs. Moxley also expressed the feeling of the members of the Ladies' Aid, who regretted the departure of both Mr. and Mrs. Mershon.

A letter from the estate of the late George Mills was received, containing a cheque for a substantial sum, sent in accordance with the wishes expressed in the will of Mr. Mills, who was a faithful member and deacon of Bethel Church for so many years.

The following are the church officers elected for the ensuing year: Treasurer, Alexis Kennedy; auditors, F. J. Wilson and F. A. Haines, the former also acting as church secretary for the present time. B. W. Robertson and H. Kennedy were re-elected missionary treasurers.

Next Sunday will be the last of Mr. Mershon's pastorate.

IN MILITARY CIRCLES

Officers Who Have Qualified — W. McCullagh's Appointment.

The cadets of Sydenham high school are ordering uniforms of a dark khaki material that ought to prove well adapted for the work.

The shooting competition for the W. F. Nickle trophy will commence next week and continue until April. The miniature Ross rifle will be used. The cup will be open to competitors each year.

W. McCullagh, of the post office staff, has been taken on the strength of the 21st Battalion and has been appointed transport sergeant, vice Sergt. Birkett.

Col. H. R. Duff inspected Companies Nos. 2 and 4 on Thursday.

The Belleville Ontario says: "The expenditure which will be necessitated by the mobilization of the 29th Battalion in Belleville will be very great, outside of the initial or preparatory expenses. Kingston considers that her 1,500 or 1,600 soldiers are worth \$25,000 to \$100,000 per month to the Limestone City. At that rate Belleville's advantage should be in the neighborhood of some \$65,000 to \$75,000 per month."

The battalion on Thursday was given short route marches through the city streets, as the country roads are in very bad condition with drifts.

In the first contingent the 15th Regiment supplied two officers and sixty-five men; in the second contingent, fifty-five men, and in the third, seventy-two, making a total of 194.
